

WHEREAS. The City of Alpine on the 13th day of February, 2021, has suffered widespread or severe damage, injury, or loss of life or property (or there is imminent threat of same) resulting from

FEBRUARY WINTER WEATHER 2021

WHERAS, The City Council of the City of Alpine has determined that extraordinary measures must be taken to alleviate the suffering of people and to protect or rehabilitate property.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT PROCLAIMED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALPINE:

That a local state of disaster is hereby declared for City of Alpine pursuant to §418.108(a) of the Texas Government Code.

Pursuant of §418.108(b) of the Texas Government Code, the state of disaster shall continue for a period of not more than seven (7) days from the date of this declaration unless continued or renewed by the City Council of the City of Alpine:

Pursuant of §418.108(c) of the Texas Government Code, this declaration of a local state of disaster shall be given prompt and general publicity and shall be filed promptly with City Secretary.

Pursuant of §418.108(d) of the Texas Government Code, this declaration of a local state of disaster activates the City emergency management plan.

That this proclamation shall take effect immediately from and after its issuance.



Thank you for your past support of regional water planning. Your willingness to shoulder a portion of the administrative costs associated with the planning effort enables the members of the Far West Texas Water Planning Group to continue to work on everyone's behalf to carry out the state's mandate to plan for the future of the region's water resources. I apologize for the delay in sending out the agreement and invoice. The group was determining the most appropriate cost share to utilize for FY 21.

The proposed FY 21 Administrative Cost Share agreement for the water planning group members and the Rio Grande Council of Governments for the provision of administrative services to the Far West Texas Water Planning Group is attached for your review. I have also included the invoice and cost share schedule that shows the pro rata share of administrative costs assigned to each city, county, and water supplier in the planning region. Your entity's proposed pro rata share per year for FY21 is \$1,981.52.

These pro rata share amounts were determined utilizing the final Texas Water Development Board Water User Group (WUG) population data. The 85/15 proposed cost share plan uses the same urban/rural proportional share approved by the Far West Texas Water Planning Group during the initial planning cycle.

FY 2021 - FY 2022 ADMINISTRATIVE COST AGREEMENT FOR THE FAR WEST TEXAS WATER PLAN

This Agreement ("the Agreement") is entered into on the date specified below between the RIO GRANDE COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS ("the COG"), acting as agent for the FAR WEST TEXAS WATER PLANNING GROUP ("the Planning Group"), and City of Alpine, (City of Alpine), all entities created by the laws of the State of Texas ("the parties").

RECITALS:

- A. The 75th Legislature of the State of Texas mandated regional water planning under the direction of the Texas Water Development Board ("the TWDB") in an Act known as Senate Bill 1 and required that the regional plans be updated every five years.
- B. The Planning Group is charged with providing a comprehensive regional water plan ("the water plan") for Brewster, Culberson, EI Paso, Hudspeth, Jeff Davis, Presidio, and Terrell counties, Texas, which was designated by the TWDB as Planning Area E ("the Planning Area").
- C. The rules of the TWDB currently require that 100% of the administrative costs of developing the water plan ("the administrative costs") will be met with voluntary contributions from entities and individuals in the Planning Area.
- **D.** The Planning Group, the COG, and City of Alpine have agreed to cooperate in funding a portion of the administrative costs for fiscal year 2021 ("FY 2021", October 1, 2020 through September 30, 2021) and fiscal year 2022 ("FY 2022", October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022).

AGREEMENT:

Now, therefore, in connection with and as a result of the foregoing, and for and in consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements contained in the Agreement, the parties contract and evidence their agreement as follows:

- 1. Administrative Contribution. City of Alpine will contribute the amount of One Thousand and Nine Hundred and Eighty-One Dollars and Fifty-Two Cents (\$1,981.52) in FY 2021 and FY 2022 toward the administrative costs of the water plan ("the payment"). The payment shall be made from the current revenues of City of Alpine and does not constitute a commitment of future revenues.
- 2. Administrative Agent. City of Alpine agrees that the COG will act as the administrative agent for the Planning Group to accept, hold, and distribute the payment. Payment should be made payable to Rio Grande Council of Governments.
- 3. **Independent Contractors**. The parties agree that all of the consultants of the Planning Group and all of their employees are independent contractors and not employees of any party to the Agreement.

- 4. Change in Cost or Funding of the Administrative Costs. The COG and the Planning Group presently estimate that the administrative costs for FY 2021 and FY 2022 will be \$62,000. In the event that the administrative costs are less than these amounts, a pro rata portion of the payment by City of Alpine will be refunded to City of Alpine promptly. In the event that the legislature of the State of Texas (or the TWDB) decides to fund any portion of the administrative costs, City of Alpine's pro rata portion of the excess will be refunded City of Alpine promptly. In the event that the administrative costs exceed \$62,000 in FY 2021 or FY 2022, City of Alpine will owe no portion of the deficiency unless the parties may subsequently agree.
- 5. Entire Agreement and Subsequent Agreements. The Agreement contains the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes any prior understandings or agreements. No amendment, modification, alteration, or extension of the terms of the Agreement shall be binding unless the change or amendment is in writing, dated subsequent to the date the Agreement was executed, and duly executed by the parties.
- 6. **Illegality or Unenforceability**. In case anyone or more of the provisions contained in the Agreement shall, for any reason, be held to be invalid in any respect, then and in that event all remaining provisions of the Agreement shall continue in full force and effect the same as if such invalidity had never been contained in the Agreement.
- 7. Notices. Any and all notices required by the Agreement or desired to be given by any party shall be given personally or by certified, registered, or express mail, or by commercial courier service, sent to the party entitled to the notice at the address set forth below that party's signature to the Agreement unless the party shall have notified the other in a similar manner of a change of address.
- 8. Term. This Agreement shall take effect on January 1, 2021 (regardless of the date executed) and terminate on September 20, 2021. This Agreement shall automatically renew on October 1, 2021, unless either of the Parties gives thirty (30) days' written notice of its intent not to renew. The renewal term, if any, will terminate on September 30, 2022.



Section 20.09. - Review and evaluation criteria.

The planning and zoning commission and city council shall review and evaluate conditional use permit applications using the following criteria:

- 1. Conformance with applicable regulations and standards established by the zoning regulations.
- 2.Compatibility with existing or permitted uses on abutting sites, in terms of building height, bulk and scale, setbacks and open spaces, landscaping and site development, access and circulation features.
- 3. Potentially unfavorable affects or impacts on other existing or permitted uses on abutting sites, to the extent such impacts exceed those which reasonably may result from use of the site for a permitted use.
- 4.Modifications to the site plan which would result in increased compatibility, would mitigate potentially unfavorable impacts, would be necessary to conform to applicable regulations and standards and would protect the public health, safety, and general welfare.
- 5.Safety and convenience of vehicular and pedestrian circulation in the vicinity, including traffic reasonably expected to be generated by the proposed use and other uses reasonable and anticipated in the area; existing zoning and land uses in the area.
- 6.Protection of persons and property from erosion, flood or water damage, fire, noise, glare and similar hazards and impacts.

- 7.Location, lighting, and type of signs; the relation of signs to traffic control and adverse effect of signs on adjacent properties.
- 8. Adequacy and convenience of off-street parking and loading facilities.
- 9. Determination that the proposed use is in accordance with the objectives of these zoning regulations and the purposes of the zone in which the site is located.
- 10.Determination that the proposed use will comply with each of the applicable provisions of these zoning regulations.
- 11.Determination that the proposed use and site development, together with any modifications applicable thereto, will be compatible with existing or permitted uses in the vicinity.
- 12.Determination that any conditions applicable to approval are the minimum necessary to minimize potentially unfavorable impacts on nearby uses and to ensure compatibility of the proposed use with existing or permitted uses in the same district and the surrounding area.
- 13.Determination that the proposed use, together with the conditions applicable thereto, will not be detrimental to the public health, safety, or welfare or materially injurious to properties or improvements in the vicinity.

(Ord. No. 2016-08-02, 9-20-16, Ord. No. 2016-10-03, 11-1-16)

Section. 20.11. - Conditions.

The planning and zoning commission, in considering and determining its recommendation, and the city council, on any request for a conditional use permit, may require from the applicant plans, information, operation data and expert evaluation concerning the location, function and characteristics of any building or use proposed. In authorizing the location of any of these uses listed as conditional use permits, the city council may impose such development standards and safeguards as the conditions and location indicate important to welfare and protection of adjacent property from excessive noise, vibration, dust, smoke, fumes, gas, odor, explosion, glare, offensive view or other undesirable or hazardous conditions. The city council, in approving or conditionally approving a conditional use permit, may set forth in its decision reasonable conditions which will ensure the intent and purposes of the zoning regulations and avoid the creation or detrimental effect upon abutting properties which may include, but not limited to the following:

- 1.Duration of use:
- 2.Fences, hedges and walls
- 3. Regulation of noise, vibration, odors, etc. Regulation of time for certain activities;
- 4. Regulation of use or uses

- 5. Requiring street, service road or alley dedications and improvements or appropriate bonds;
- 6.Time period in which the proposed use shall be developed or constructed;
- 7. Surfacing of parking areas;
- 8.Special yards, spaces and buffers
- 9. Regulation of locations of vehicular ingress and egress; and
- 10.Including such other conditions that will make possible the development occurs in an orderly and efficient manner, and in conformity with the intent and purposes of applicable ordinances.

Chapter 10 - ANIMALSIII

ARTICLE II. - KEEPING ANIMALS

DIVISION 1. - GENERALLY

Sec. 10-41. - Standards.

- (a) Requirements for outside dogs—Confinement requirements for dogs kept outdoors. An owner of a dog commits an offense if the fenced yard, or other pen or structure, used as the primary living area for the dog to regularly eat, sleep, drink and eliminate is not:
 - (1) At least 150 square feet for each dog six months of age or older;
 - (2) Designed, constructed, and composed of material sufficient to prevent the dog's escape; and
 - (3) Designed in a manner that provides the dog access to the inside of a dog house, building, or shelter that meets all requirements of subsection (a)(4) of this section.
 - (4) A dog house or other building or shelter for a dog must:
 - a. Have a weatherproof top, bottom and sides;
 - b. Have an opening on no more than one side that allows the dog to remain dry and provides adequate shade during daylight hours to prevent overheating and discomfort to the dog;
 - c. Have a floor that is level and dry;
 - d. Be free from cracks, depressions, and rough areas that might be conducive to insects, parasites, and other pests;
 - e. Be of adequate size to allow the dog to stand erect with the dog's head up, to turn around easily, and to sit and lie down in a comfortable and normal position;
 - f. Have sufficient clean and dry bedding material or other means of protection from the weather that will allow the dog to retain body heat when the weather is colder than what a dog of that breed and condition can tolerate;
 - g. Provide suitable means for the prompt elimination of excess liquids;
 - h. Be structurally sound, maintained in good repair, and constructed with material that protects the dog from injury; and
 - Allows the dog in and out.
- (b) No person having charge or custody of an animal shall place or confine an animal or allow an animal to be placed or confined or to remain in a motor vehicle or trailer under such conditions or for such period of time as may endanger the health or well-being of such animal due to heat, lack of food or water, or other such circumstances as may be reasonably expected to cause suffering, disability or death of such animal.
- (c) Owners of animals shall keep such animals restrained at all times within the city. An animal shall be deemed restrained when it is confined on the premises of the owner within a secure fence or enclosure; confined by means of a collar or harness attached to a chain or similar device anchored securely to the owner's property so as to keep the animal on the premises, out of reach of the public right-of-way (sidewalks, alleys and streets), within a vehicle being driven or parked, or under the direct physical control of a competent person by means of a secure leash not over six feet in length or similar secure device.


- (d) The owner shall keep the pen or enclosure in such a manner as not to give off odors offensive to persons residing in the vicinity, or to breed or attract flies, mosquitoes or other noxious insects, or in any manner to endanger the public health or safety, or create a public nuisance.
- (e) The owner of any large or small livestock animal shall keep all pens, enclosures and shelter structures wherein such animals or fowl are kept in a clean and sanitary condition so as not to give off offensive odors which are a source of discomfort to persons residing in the vicinity thereof. The owner of any large or small livestock animal or fowl shall not allow offal, manure and waste material of such animal to accumulate or remain in the pens, enclosures and shelter areas, excluding pasture acreage, in any manner which is conducive to the breeding or attraction of flies, mosquitoes or other noxious insects or in any manner which endangers the public health or safety, or which creates an unhealthy environment. The maintenance or permitting of the conditions in this section on any such lot or parcel of ground is hereby declared to be a public nuisance. The owner of any large or small livestock animal or fowl shall in a sanitary manner remove or dispose of all offal, manure and waste material accumulating from such animal or fowl as needed to ensure sanitary conditions and no less frequently than every 72 hours.
- (f) Feed troughs shall be provided for the feeding of vegetables, meat, scraps or garbage, and such feeding shall be done only in containers or on an impervious platform.
- (g) Watering troughs or tanks shall be provided which shall be equipped with adequate facilities for draining the overflow so as to prevent the breeding of flies, mosquitoes or other insects.
- (h) No putrescible material shall be allowed to accumulate on the premises, and all such material used as feed which is unconsumed shall be removed daily and disposed of by burial or other means approved by the animal control officer.

Sec. 10-59. - Animals in vehicles.

A person commits an offense if he intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence transports an animal in a motor vehicle, trailer or other conveyance in a cruel, inhumane or unsafe manner or fails to effectively and humanely restrain the animal so as to prevent the animal from jumping from or being thrown from the vehicle, trailer or other conveyance during its normal operation.

- (a) A person commits an offense if he intentionally, knowingly, recklessly or with criminal negligence transports an animal in a motor vehicle, trailer or other conveyance in a cruel, inhumane or unsafe manner or fails to effectively and humanely restrain the animal so as to prevent the animal from jumping from or being thrown from the vehicle, trailer or other conveyance during its normal operation.
- (b) No person having charge or custody of an animal shall place or confine an animal or allow an animal to be placed or confined or to remain in a motor vehicle or trailer under such conditions or for such period of time as may endanger the health or well-being of such animal due to heat, lack of food or water, or other such circumstances as may be reasonably expected to cause suffering, disability or death of such animal

ORDINANCE 2021-03-01

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALPINE, TEXAS RESCINDING AND REPEALING ORDINANCE 2020-02-01 AND AMENDING THE ALPINE CODE OF ORDINANCES ACCORDINGLY; PROVIDING REPEALING AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; PROVIDING A TEXAS OPEN MEETINGS ACT CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Alpine has cause in pursuit of their legislative duties on behalf of citizens of Alpine to modify and improve rules and regulations concerning public safety; and

WHEREAS, after thorough review of actions stemming from the passage of Ordinance 2020-02-01, it is apparent that the reversal of the ordinance would benefit the City; and



ORDINANCE 2021-03-02

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALPINE, TEXAS AMENDING CHAPTER 10 – ANIMALS, SECTION 10-1 AND ESTABLISHING SECTIONS 10-10 AND 10-11 TO THE ALPINE CODE OF ORDINANCES; PROVIDING REPEALING AND SEVERABILITY CLAUSES; PROVIDING A TEXAS OPEN MEETINGS ACT CLAUSE; AND PROVIDING AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Alpine has cause in pursuit of their legislative duties on behalf of citizens of Alpine to modify and improve rules and regulations concerning animals; and

WHEREAS, the Animal Advisory Board has recommended changes to Chapter 10 – Animals to the Alpine Code of Ordinances; and

WHEREAS, it is deemed to be in the best interest of the City to amend Section 10-1, and establish Section 10-10 in Chapter 10 – Animals to the Alpine Code of Ordinances.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ALPINE, TEXAS THAT:

SECTION I FINDINGS OF FACT

All of the premises attached in the form hereto described as Exhibit "A" are hereby found to be true and correct legislative and factual findings of the City Council of the City of Alpine and are hereby approved and incorporated herein as findings of fact.

SECTION II CUMULATIVE CLAUSE

This ordinance shall be cumulative of all provisions of the City of Alpine, Texas, except where the provisions of this Ordinance are in direct conflict with the provisions of such Ordinance, in which event the conflicting provisions of such Ordinance are hereby repealed.

EXHIBIT "A"

Sec. 10-1. - Definitions.

The following words, terms and phrases, when used in this chapter, shall have the meanings ascribed to them in this section, except where the context clearly indicates a different meaning:

Altered animal means an animal having been spayed or neutered.

Animal means any living vertebrate creature except human beings and with the exclusion of fish, amphibians, reptiles, caged birds and small rodents when kept as pets in a private residence, or enclosed in a commercial enclosure. The word "animal" shall mean only a mammal when referring specifically to the control of rabies.

Animal control officer or ACO means a duly authorized person responsible for the enforcement of this chapter including peace officers.

Animal shelter means any premises designated or operated by the city for the purpose of impounding and caring for animals under the authority of this chapter.

Attack means definite vigorous, aggressive action by a dog directly against a person or other animal which results in the infliction of bodily injury, or the threat of bodily injury, by such dog to a person or other animal.

Bee, bee keeping and bee hives means any of numerous hairy-bodied insects including social and solitary species, the cultivation of bees on any commercial scale for the production of honey or bees, and a hive is a manmade receptacle that houses a swarm of bees.

Bite means an abrasion, scratch, puncture, tear or piercing of the skin actually or suspected of being caused by the mouth of any animal.

City or City of Alpine means officials of the City of Alpine including, but not limited to, the city manager, the animal control officer, and any City of Alpine peace officer.

Collar means a band, chain, harness or other suitable device worn about the neck of an animal to which a current rabies vaccination registration tag can be affixed.

Continual noise or frequent or long continued noise means noise pollution, unwanted or excessive sound, a nuisance that interferes with activities, for example owning an animal that causes frequent or long-continued noise, by barking or howling, that disturbs the comfort of any person.

Current vaccination means vaccinated and satisfying the following:

- (1) The animal must have been at least three months of age at the time of vaccination.
- (2) At least 30 days have elapsed since the initial vaccination.
- (3) Not more than 12 months have elapsed since the most recent vaccination.

Dangerous animal means any animal that:

- (1) Has inflicted severe injury on a human being without provocation;
- (2) Has injured or killed a domestic animal without provocation; or
- (3) Has been previously found to be potentially dangerous, the owner having received notice of such and the animal again aggressively bites, attacks, or endangers the safety of humans or domestic animals.

Potentially dangerous animal means any animal that when unprovoked:

- (1) Inflicts injury on a human or a domestic animal; or
- (2) Chases or approaches a person upon the streets, sidewalks, or any public grounds in a menacing fashion or apparent attitude of attack; or
- (3) Has a known propensity, tendency, or disposition to attack, or to cause injury or otherwise to threaten the safety of humans or domestic animals.

Dangerous dog means a dog that:

- (1) Makes an unprovoked attack on a person that causes bodily injury and occurs in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept and that was reasonably certain to prevent the dog from leaving the enclosure on its own; or
- (2) Commits unprovoked acts in a place other than an enclosure in which the dog was being kept and that was reasonably certain to prevent the dog from leaving the enclosure on its own and such acts cause a person to reasonably believe that the dog will attack and cause bodily injury to that person.

Dilapidated means a building, structure or material that has fallen into partial ruin by neglect or misuse or into a condition of partial decay.

Dog means any member of the canis familiaris species.

Domestic animals means animal species which generally have their breeding controlled by people and which by their long association with people have been developed into breeds or types for specific uses by people.

Domesticated means a tame animal that is subject to the dominion and control of an owner and accustomed to living in or near human habitation without requiring extraordinary restraint or unreasonably disturbing such human habitation.

Dwelling means any building or portion thereof which is designed and used for residential purposes. An attached garage shall be deemed to be part of a dwelling.

Enclosed structure means a building or other similar structure that is fully enclosed with a roof in place to provide a degree of protection, and does not include a yard or fence.

Euthanasia means putting to death of an animal in a manner and method which does not cause pain nor take longer than one minute to effect unconsciousness or death, and is in compliance with the provisions of V.T.C.A., Health and Safety Code ch. 823. Shooting firearms into a pen or enclosure containing multiple animals is prohibited by the Texas Health and Safety Code and shall not satisfy the requirement under the definition of euthanasia or humane destruction of animals. Lethal injection and efficiently operating carbon monoxide chambers shall, throughout this chapter, be presumed to be the method of euthanasia employed by the city.

Euthanize means to kill in a humane manner.

Exotic animal means any animal that is not livestock or a domesticated animal and includes, but is not limited to, no matter how well-trained: all alligators and crocodiles; all bears; all cats other than the commonly accepted domesticated cats, including but not limited to cheetah, leopard, lion, lynx, panther, cougar, mountain lion, bobcat, and tiger; all dogs other than domesticated dogs, including but not limited to wolf, part wolf, fox, part fox, coyote, and part coyote; all porcupines; all nonhuman primates; all raccoons; all skunks; all venomous fish and piranha; all venomous snakes and lizards; and all weasels other than ferrets.

Exposed to rabies means an animal which has been exposed to rabies if it has been bitten by another animal or has been in contact with any animal known to be or suspected of being infected with rabies.

Feral animal means formerly domesticated animals and their offspring which have roamed at large for a sufficient period of time and with sufficient success at survival as to be deemed no longer domesticated.

Food means bread products, corn, fruit, oats, hay, nuts, wheat, alfalfa, salt blocks, feed, grain, vegetables, and commercially sold wildlife feed, or livestock feed, but excludes live naturally growing shrubs, live crops, plants, flowers, vegetation, gardens, trees, and fruit or nuts that have fallen on the ground or are within reach of wildlife.

Fowl means any domesticated bird used as food by people, such as chickens, ducks, turkeys, geese, guinea fowl, peafowl or pigeons.

Horse means any member of the equine family.

Humanely destroy means to cause the death of an animal by a method which:

- (1) Rapidly produces unconsciousness and death without visible evidence of pain or distress; or
- (2) Utilizes anesthesia produced by an agent which causes painless loss of consciousness and death following such loss of consciousness.

Keep or harbor means to have charge, custody or control of an animal or fowl, or permitting the animal or fowl to habitually remain or be lodged or fed within the house, store, yard, enclosure or place of the owner or occupant of the premises.

Kennel means any premises on which four or more dogs or four or more cats, four months of age or older, are kept; or where the business of buying, selling, breeding, grooming, training or boarding of dogs or cats is conducted. The term "kennel" does not include veterinary hospitals or humane societies.

Large livestock animal means cattle, horses, mules, beasts of burden, or any other similar domesticated animal.

License, registration or permit means a printed authorization issued by the city allowing the holder to keep the animal described within the corporate limits.

Livestock means domestic animals of the equine, bovine, ovine, caprine or porcine genera.

Nuisance means disturbing the peace, emitting noxious or offensive odors or otherwise endangering or being offensive to the environment of the city.

Own means to own, keep, harbor or have charge, custody or control of an animal or fowl.

Owner means any person who owns, harbors, keeps or causes or permits to be harbored or kept, or has in his care, an animal or bird on or about his premises or any person keeping, harboring, having charge or control of, or permitting to habitually be or remain on such person's premises any animal for a period of six consecutive days or more.

Pet animal means dogs, cats, birds, guinea pigs, hamsters, mice, snakes, iguana and turtles. Pet animal shall also include any domesticated animal that a person owns or that is sold or offered for sale for the purpose of being kept indoors as household pets.

Quarantine means to place an animal in a secure enclosure which precludes physical contact with any other animal.

Rabies means an acute viral disease of man and animal affecting the central nervous system and usually transmitted by an animal bite.

Restrained or confined means an animal restricted to the property of the owner or under the direct physical control of a competent person.

Retail sale means the business of selling pet animals directly to consumers of the public.

Run at large means free of physical restraint beyond an enclosed or fenced area; includes any animal that is not under the actual control of its owner.

Small livestock animal means swine, sheep, goats or any other domesticated or wild animal of smaller stature, except pet animals or fowl.

Stray means any animal running free with no physical restraint beyond the premises of the owner.

Swine means any member of the Suidae species.

Unaltered animal means an animal that has not been spayed or neutered.

Vaccination means the inoculation of an animal with a vaccine that is licensed by the United States Department of Agriculture, and which is administered by a veterinarian for the purpose of immunizing the animal against rabies.

Veterinarian means a veterinarian holding a current and valid license to practice veterinary medicine in the state.

Wild animal means any non-domestic animal.

Wildlife means any undomesticated animals living in the wild.

Sec. 10-10. - Wildlife Feeding

Within the city limits of Alpine the feeding of wildlife has resulted in overabundant and highly concentrated populations of wildlife throughout the City and within City parks; and specifically, the feeding of deer has been shown to increase the concentration of deer in these areas, thereby increasing the likelihood of collisions between vehicles and deer and increasing damage to residential and commercial vegetation and landscaping in the City.

The City of Alpine and the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department find that discouraging and prohibiting the artificial feeding of wildlife is in the best interest of the health, safety and welfare of the community and wildlife populations.

(a) Feeding of wildlife prohibited.

- (1) Except as provided below in 10-62, (b) (1) and (2), a person commits an offense if the person intentionally feeds wildlife by making food available for consumption on private or public property within the city limits of the city.
- (2) A person shall be deemed to have purposely fed or caused wildlife to be fed if the person places food, as defined in this section, in any form, (not including live vegetation such as ornamental landscaping or flowers) on the ground, or within reach of wildlife.
- (3) A person who violates any provision of this ordinance commits an offense.

(b) Exceptions; Affirmative Defenses

- (1) This ordinance does not apply to the placement of food into feeders kept at a minimum of 5 feet above the ground surface and intended for birds.
- (2) This ordinance does not apply to an animal control officer, veterinarian, peace officer, City employee, federal or state wildlife official, who is acting pursuant to a lawfully authorized program to treat, manage, capture, trap, hunt, or remove wildlife and who is acting within the scope of the person's authority.
- (3) It is an affirmative defense to prosecution under this section if a person places food, in good faith, for the purpose of feeding domestic livestock or domestic pets located on their property.

(c) Enforcement.

- (1) Animal Control Officers, Park Rangers, Code Compliance Officers and Police Officers are hereby given full power and authority to enforce this ordinance.
- (2) It is a violation to hinder, molest or interfere with anyone authorized or empowered to perform any duty under this ordinance.

(d) Penalties.

- (1) A person who commits a violation of this ordinance will first be given a warning and will be provided information on the negative impacts of wildlife feeding. A second offense will result in prosecution in municipal court. Any violation of this ordinance is deemed a Class C misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$75.00 or more than \$500.00. Each day any violation of any provision of this Code shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.
- (2) Nothing in this section shall be construed as to limit any civil action the city may take to enforce the terms of this ordinance.

Sec. 10-11 - Hunting.

- (1) No person shall hunt, molest, harm, frighten, tease, shoot, or throw missiles at any animal, including domestic or wildlife within city limits.
- (2) No person shall remove or have in his possession the young of any wildlife, or the eggs, or nest or young of any reptile or fowl within city limits.
