


## Local Information Update

### Brewster County Statistics – April 13<sup>th</sup>, 2021

Active Case Counts – 14 , Hospitalization – N/A

CV-Team Meetings stopped for time being

Vaccination 46.7% Brewster County versus 35.0% for State of Texas. Slowing down in Brewster County

City Staff had several cases (employees and immediate family members) in March 2021

- Numbers have stabilized and most have returned to work


### Summary of Bill

### HB 4305 & SB 2133

- for the promotion and preservation of dark skies through construction and maintenance of infrastructure and the purchase and installation of hardware that reduces light pollution and sky glow
- shall make a good-faith estimate based on reasonable documentation of the annual amount of area hotel revenue attributable to dark skies related events and activities (Estimation of visitors to area for Marfa Lights, Sky Parties, etc.)
- Limit up to 25% for HOT revenue
- Protects spending of Marketing & Advertising
- Purchasing lights help local businesses and installation from local electrician

### Problem:


- Light pollution increasing 2% each year

- Cost savings




### Lights Down, Stars Up




Council revisions to Ordinance

Consider impacts of timeline on residents

Impacts to Government and Non-Profit Facilities

First Reading May 4<sup>th</sup> (or 18<sup>th</sup>), Public Hearing and Second Reading May 18<sup>th</sup> (or June 1<sup>st</sup>) Concerns about blue light reach far beyond our health. Outdoor lighting with strong blue content is likely to worsen skyglow because it has a significantly larger geographic reach than lighting consisting of less blue. According to the 2016 "World Atlas of Artificial Night Sky Brightness" street lighting and outdoor lighting retrofits using 4000K lamps could result in a factor of 2.5 increase in light pollution. Given that the rate of increase of lighting as seen from Earth orbit is about 2 percent per year, and much of the increase is attributable to white LED, it is all the more important to address this problem.

Blue-rich white light sources are also known to increase glare and compromise human vision, especially in the aging eye<sup>5,6</sup>. These lights create potential road safety problems for motorists and pedestrians alike. In natural settings, blue light at night has been shown to adversely affect wildlife behavior and reproduction<sup>7,8</sup>. This particularly true in cities, which are often stopover points for migratory species.






# Infrastructure Construction and Improvements

The Collections and Distribution Division installed over 1,300ft of 4" C900 PVC pipe down Lechuguilla

In addition to our CAP projects, the Distribution & Collections crews have also been engaged in the completion of numerous water & sewer taps, a major sewer line replacement (100ft of main) on John W., as well as numerous leaks

Crews will be focusing on new taps, tap assessments and Fire Hydrant replacement during the months of May-June 2021, and a comprehensive CLA-VAL change out in early summer of 21'.





## TCEQ Compliance Inspections 2017-2020

Relative to Inspections this past fall, TCEQ reiterated to City of Alpine admin & field staff that "this is the best inspections that the city has had in 20 years, and that there has been a drastic improvement in the way that things are operating now."

Three violations over the past 4 years have now been sent to enforcement (specifics outlined in Packet)

- Opportunities to utilize SEP (Supplemental Environmental Projects) to pay for fines. This allows us to put the money back into the City of Alpine Infrastructure
- We currently have multiple projects (mostly related to Kokernot Park and Lodge program with SRSU) that are eligible for the SEP work

# Emergency Operations Winter Storm / Power Outage

City of Alpine Water & Wastewater Utilities departments were able to maintain above minimum acceptable water pressure to the entire community, as well as normal wastewater treatment operations

In the months prior to the storm & power outage, the water utilities department had already composed an Emergency Operations draft that included provisions & contact information for equipment and vendors to utilize during these types of events, and already had infrastructure in place to "Quick Connect" city owned & rental generators to most of our (Well & Pump) locations where required for operation

I am very proud of the Utilities Division's performance during the weather event and would encourage you to wave at our staff when you see them out & about keeping your communities water flowing and toilets flushing!
