







5 Metrics to Follow

ICU hospital bed occupancy

- This can change very quickly day to day. BBRMC would know this metric.
- Goal: less than 60% occupancy

New COVID-19 infections(can be measured daily, weekly, or 14-day)

- 14-day goal: less than 50 new cases per 100,000 people
- Brewster County goal: less than new 4 cases over 14 days for the 9,267 population

Texas Infection Reproduction Rate(<u>https://rt.live/us/TX</u>)

- Goal is to be less than 1.0
- For every 100 individuals infected, they infect X number of people
 - If each infection didn't lead to another person being infected, the number of cases would decrease over time

Testing positivity rates

Goal: less than 5% positivity rate

Average weekly testing

- Goal: 150 tests per 100,000 population
- Tri-County goal: 198 tests weekly











As of today Brewster county is at 90% compliance, with 2140 cases disposed out of a total of 2369. The requirement is 90% by July 31 2021, so reaching 90% this early in the cycle is impressive.

I have attached an updated open offense report showing all the open offenses in the county for the 2015-2019 time period. We audit 5 years, with a 2 year buffe (2020,2021 don't count yet). Open offense reports are for criminal justice purposes only, and not public record since they contain identifiable information for cases which have not been disposed of yet.


I also attached a breakdown of the percentages year by year. 2019 shows 59%, this is normal since it's the most recent year and many cases are still going through the system. Especially felonies which can take years to clear.







Total Stray Intakes


Dogs are reflected in blue Cats in pink








Total Animals Picked up for 2018,2019, 2020 for months July- September

5 puppies born at the shelter



City Licenses

Why do we do licensing?

1.) Rabies vaccination regulation must provide proof of rabies vaccine

2.) Pet identification shows that the animal is owned, records kept at the shelter make it easier to contact an owner if the pet ends up in the shelter.

Fees?

What is considered Running at Large?

Sec. 10-117. - Running at large prohibited

No person keeping or harboring any animal or fowl shall permit such animal or fowl, except pigeons, to go loose or run at large in any of the public ways of the city or upon the property of another, except in enclosures on the private property owned or leased by the person keeping or harboring such animal or fowl. Any unidentifiable or unidentified animal not wearing a collar displaying a rabies vaccination tag will be considered stray or feral, and shall be subject to animal control.

Sec. 10-1. - Definitions.

Restrained or confined means an animal restricted to the property of the owner or under the direct physical control of a competent person.

Run at large means free of physical restraint beyond an enclosed or fenced area; includes any animal that is not under the actual control of its owner.

Stray means any animal running free with no physical restraint beyond the premises of the owner.


State laws on vaccines

Texas State law requires all cats and dogs over the age of 16 weeks to receive a rabies vaccination by a licensed veterinarian.

As per TVMA (Texas Veterinary Medical Association) all other vaccinations (DA2PP, Bordetella, Felv, FVRCP) administered for the public would be considered a non veterinarian preforming veterinary care with out a license. They also mentioned that there is possibility of allergic reaction with any vaccination so there is a liability if a non city owned animal was to have a reaction at the shelter.
