





## 5 Metrics to Follow

#### ICU hospital bed occupancy

- This can change very quickly day to day. BBRMC would know this metric.
- Goal: less than 60% occupancy

#### **New COVID-19 infections**(can be measured daily, weekly, or 14-day)

- 14-day goal: less than 50 new cases per 100,000 people
- Brewster County goal: less than new 4 cases over 14 days for the 9,267 population

## **Texas Infection Reproduction Rate (https://rt.live/us/TX)**

- Goal is to be less than 1.0
- For every 100 individuals infected, they infect X number of people
  - If each infection didn't lead to another person being infected, the number of cases would decrease over time

#### **Testing positivity rates**

Goal: less than 5% positivity rate

#### Average weekly testing

Goal: 150 tests per 100,000 population

Tri-County goal: 198 tests weekly



Focused on Language changes to existing Ordinance


Items/Sections Discussed in more detail

- Sec. 18-234. General Provisions flagpole illumination
- Sec. 18-233. Nonconforming preexisting outdoor light fixtures
- Illumination impacts in certain venues ie. Airport

Providing the balance with the new language that helps tackle administration of new light sources that are deployed (through new and remodel construction) along with a plan to work with the community on education about the impacts of the preexisting outdoor lighting. Being sensitive to the cost and community impacts

Will also need to work further on the impacts of the lighting for the ballfields (all are government owned)

Third Workshop planned for January 2021






#### City of Alpine General Fund Revenues as of November 30, 2020 SALES TAX REVENUE



City of Alpine General Fund Revenues as of November 30, 2020 AD VALOREM TAX




City of Alpine General Fund Expenditures as of November 30, 2020










#### City of Alpine Gas Utility Expenditures as of November 30, 2020




City of Alpine Hotel Occupency Tax Revenue and Expenditures YTD as of November 30, 2020



City of Alpine Airport Revenue and Expenditures YTD as of November 30, 2020




City of Alpine Interest and Sinking Revenue and Expenditures as of November 30, 2020

*City's contribution = \$144,175 (975% ROI)* 

# Grant Applications Pending = \$285,000

- Texas Parks & Wildlife Department- Local Parks Non-Urban Outdoor Recreation Grant: \$200,000 towards full development of Pueblo Nuevo Park in Ward 4. Submitted 11/6/2020. Awards announced 5/2021. (50% City match= \$200,000.)
- FEMA Building Resilient Infrastructure & Communities (BRIC) Grant: \$80,000 for Hazard Mitigation Planning efforts. Submitted 12/1/2020. (25% City match= \$20,000)
- Texas Department of Agriculture- GO TEXAN! Grant: \$5,000 towards promotion of Midweek Mercantile & Music events in 2021. To be submitted by 12/15/2020.

*City's contribution = \$220,000 (130% ROI)*

- CDBG- Rural Assistance, Community Development FY21-22 Grant: \$350,000 CDBG/\$52,500 City. Due 5/2021.
- TX Department of Agriculture, CDBG- Downtown Revitalization Grant: \$216,000 TX-DAg-CDBG/\$10,800 City. Due 6/2021.

- 6. Seal coat/fog seal






# STREETS SEAL COATING MAP
