AGENDA ITEM #1 – National Fitness Campaign Pre-Application

Carrie stated that after the July 11, 2017 Parks and Recreation Board meeting, administration contacted the National Fitness Campaign (NFC) to garner more information based on questions that were raised from the Parks and Recreation Board.

John asked administration if the fitness equipment would withstand the Michigan winter months and that having a cover over the equipment such as the shelter at Springdale Park would extend the season.

Lauren stated that during our follow up call to NFC, Birmingham was invited to submit a preapplication to become a partnering community. While several properties and parks in the city were discussed, final location is still to be determined. Lauren stated that the application does not commit the City of Birmingham in any way. Lauren stated that the application is very preliminary.

Lauren stated the application is attached for the Parks and Recreation Board review.

Therese stated that she thinks if the City of Birmingham submitted an application that the City of Birmingham is automatically approved for the \$10,000 grant. Therese stated that there is also a maintenance concern.

John stated that in Grosse Pointe there is a park known as Three Miles Park which has a trail that has a variety of fitness equipment along the trail that seems maintenance free.

Therese stated that adding fitness equipment along a trail system at Kenning Park has been discussed.

Art stated that there are additional questions that need to be answered before the (NFC) project can move forward.

Lauren stated with that Johnson Hill Land Ethics will come up with cost estimates for the entire property and also construction costs for the ballfields.

Lauren stated that a revised Kenning Park Master Plan will be reviewed by the Parks and Recreation Board.

Lauren stated that Joe Valentine, City of Birmingham Manager will forward Birmingham Little League (BBL) donor agreement to a future City Commission meeting.

DEPARTMENT SUMMARY

Parks and Recreation

This activity provides for park maintenance and recreation programming of park facilities, excluding the golf courses. Maintenance is provided for over 230 acres of parks and public properties, including passive-recreation areas along the Rouge Trail, in Manor Park and at similar locations.

Recreation facilities maintained under this activity include: 16 asphalt-surfaced tennis courts; six Little League baseball diamonds; one baseball diamond and one softball diamond; a developed picnic area and shelter at Springdale Park; 22 park areas of various sizes and stages of development; a six-acre nature preserve at Manor Park; several miles of river trails; the 14-acre Quarton Lake; the winter-sports area at Lincoln Hills; a skate park located at Kenning Park; and a .85-acre dog park located at the Lincoln Hills Golf Course, which opened in November of 2010.

This activity provides funds for the maintenance of approximately 13,000 trees in City parks and on other City properties (excluding trees within the street rights-of-way, which are maintained under another fund). Tree and stump removal, tree trimming and tree planting in City parks are also included in this activity. The department utilizes both staff and outside contractors for services such as forestry, lawn care and property maintenance.

Various park developments over the past several years include: Booth Park, which features a community-built playground and sled hill; Barnum Park, which features a softball field, grand promenade, an archway from the original schoolhouse located on the property and an outdoor ice rink; Shain Park, located in the heart of the City, which features a plaza fountain, granite décor and a band shell; and the previously mentioned dog park at the Lincoln Hills Golf Course.

Notes and Adjustments to Department-Requested Amounts from Prior Year's Budget

- 1. **702.00 Salaries and Wages Direct** The increase of \$4,580, or 1.9%, reflects scheduled union wage increases and a new Teamster position.
- 2. 706.00 Labor Burden The decrease of \$7,214, or 4.2%, is primarily the result of a decrease in retiree health-care contributions (\$15,263) as recommended by the City's actuary. This decrease was offset by an increase in hospitalization costs (\$5,820), defined contribution retirement (\$1,650) and retiree health savings (\$530).
- **3. 729.00 Operating Supplies** The decrease of \$2,000, or 3%, reflects normal recurring costs.
- **4. 811.00 Other Contractual Service** The \$276,200 budget is primarily for the mowing and other park maintenance contractors, design consultants, holiday décor services, Adams/Poppleton Park development, the new city logo change on park signage, invasive species removal and Rouge Trail maintenance.
- **5. 922.00 Water Utility** The increase of \$38,000, or 90%, reflects increased irrigation and storm water fees.

Significant Notes to 2018-2019 Planned Amounts

- 1. **702.00 Salaries and Wages Direct** The increase of \$4,170, or 1.7%, reflects scheduled step increases and a new Teamster position.
- **2. 706.00 Labor Burden** The increase of \$8,350, or 5.0%, primarily reflects an increase in hospitalization costs (\$5,820) and pension contributions (\$1,430) as recommended by the City's actuary.
- **3. 811.00 Other Contractual Services** The decrease of \$59,000, or 21%, is primarily the result of the completion of the Adams/Poppleton Park development and implementation of the new city logo change on park signage in the prior year.

Performance Goals, Objectives and Measures

GOAL: Develop and implement the Parks and Recreation Master Plan 2017-2021 for

parks and recreation improvements using grants, private donations, and contributions from the General Fund. All improvements shall be budgeted and approved accordingly based on priority. (Long-Term Municipal Goal 4)

with community desires, including park development initiatives.

SUBJECT: Project Updates

The following serves as a brief update on some DPS projects.

Quarton Lake

We have been notified from the Engineering Department they anticipate the dredging of Quarton Lake to begin the week of September 11, 2017.

Parks and Recreation Master Plan Update

Our team has been working on this project update and meeting with McKenna Associates which has included meetings with the Master Plan Sub-Committee. Attached is a flier announcing two upcoming events. Also, in very short order the survey will be launched and made available electronically and in written format to the public. The first public engagement event will be a "Birmingham Field Day" held at the Sunday, September 17th Farmers Market. Round table discussions will be underway later in September with a variety of stakeholder groups. Upcoming on Tuesday, October 3, 2017 will be an Open House event held in advance of the Parks and Recreation Board meeting. The public engagement events and meetings provide an opportunity for as many people as possible to participate in a variety of activities to provoke and encourage input and feedback on Birmingham Parks and Recreation.

Barnum Park

It is our understanding the 9' diameter concrete pad is scheduled to be poured by the contractor along the northeast side of the path system going toward the arch this year.

National Fitness Campaign

The City of Birmingham has been notified of the grant award to be part of the 2018 National Fitness Campaign, see the attached announcement. There are still many unknowns and issues discussed by the Parks and Recreation Board that need addressing before the City can officially commit to this endeavor. There are certainly some next steps for us to take before any further action is taken by the City. We will continue to inform you of this program as we have more details.

Kenning Park

Johnson Hill Land Ethics (JHLE) is underway with the Kenning Park Master Plan revision as it pertains to the fields and easterly portion of the park.

They are preparing revisions to the current Kenning Park Master Plan to re-configure the ballfields as well as incorporate a revised walking path around the new ballfield configuration. Once a proposed new layout is determined and reviewed they will revise the cost estimates for the entire park and prepare a cost estimate for proposed construction of the two 200 foot fields. As appropriate, contact will be made with the Birmingham Little League during this process for input and to keep them updated.

Once a revised plan is available it will be presented to the Parks and Recreation Board including the proposed cost estimates for the proposed construction of the two fields. After such time, the entire package will be presented to the City Commission which will include the Donation Agreement and revised master plan along with all cost estimates.

SUBJECT: 1383 W. Lincoln – Temporary Construction Easement

The homeowners at 1383 W. Lincoln recently submitted a plan for a rear addition to their home. Due to the constraints of the property (i.e. distance between the sides of the adjacent structures) and location of the addition, the homeowner has requested the ability to access the rear of their property via the Linn Smith Park – City Park (see attached letter).

The Engineering Department reviewed this request and determined it would be next to impossible to construct the addition without access through the Park.

In order to facilitate the homeowner's request, the Engineering and the Parks & Recreation Departments worked together with the builder through the review process to provide the homeowner with a Temporary Construction Easement (see attached). This easement clearly outlines the expectations by all interested parties and is briefly summarized below:

- The builder/homeowner will be allowed to construct a 14' wide temporary access drive from Fairway Drive to the rear of their property (see exhibit B);
- A portion of the existing wood chip path in the park will be temporarily relocated (see exhibit B) and fully restored after the completion of the addition at no cost to the City;
- Tree protection will be provided for all trees in the affected area for the duration of the project. No City trees will be removed as part of this project;
- The access drive will be fenced off with a gate and screening at the Fairway Drive entrance;
- All affected areas will be completely restored to their original state after the completion
 of the addition at no cost to the City;
- The homeowner has paid a fee (\$1,664.00) to 'lease' this property from the City for the duration of the project (expected to be one year). This amount was determined based on a square foot cost of the value of the property times the square footage of the easement (see attached). This is practice is typical with similar projects of this nature (i.e. Floyd project). The lease is based on one year usage and will be prorated based on the length of the lease;

The easement has been executed and the site plan has been approved. The work is expected to begin in the coming weeks.

TEMPORARY CONSTRUCTION EASEMENT

For valuable consideration the receipt of which is hereby acknowledged, CITY OF BIRMINGHAM, a Michigan municipal corporation whose address is 151 Martin Street, Birmingham, Michigan 48012. Grantor, hereby grants, to BENCHMARK HOMES, INC., a Michigan Corporation whose address is 2911 KATIE LANE, MILFORD, MICHIGAN 48380, its licensees, and agents a temporary construction easement (the "Easement") to construct, the project at 1383 West Lincoln, Birmingham, MI, together with the right of ingress and egress for the purposes of exercising the rights conveyed in this grant of a temporary construction easement, in, upon, over and across the property of the Grantor (the "Property") as described in Exhibit A attached hereto and made a part hereof.

The easement is described on Exhibit B - attached hereto and made a part hereof.

This easement shall terminate upon either the written notice of termination of Easement from Grantees, Issuance of a Certificate of Occupancy, or upon one year after the issuance of the Temporary Construction Easement.

The Grantor shall grant the Grantees a Temporary Construction Easement on the northern 25 feet of Grantor's property lying immediately south of Grantees' property, commonly known as 1383 West Lincoln, Birmingham, Michigan, and more completely described in Exhibit B. The Grantees may install a 14 foot wide temporary construction driveway made of crushed stone. Grantees will also reroute wood chip walking path accordingly, Grantees will also install tree protection per Exhibit B and install orange fencing on each side of temporary driveway, which will remain in place until the Easement expires or is terminated by earlier action of the parties. Upon removal of the temporary driveway, the Grantees will restore the area to original condition by removing temporary access driveway and restoring wood chip walking path to its previous location, the grounds will be free of debris, graded and filled in with top soil and seeded and strawed as needed. Tree protection will also be removed at this time.

Grantor reserves the following rights with respect to the easement: a) The right to use the easement property subject to the easement provided that such use is not materially inconsistent with the right granted to Grantees under this agreement. B) The right of Ingress over, under and across the easement property, subject to the rights of Grantees under this agreement Grantees hereby agree to promptly restore in good and workmanlike manner all property damaged, destroyed or disturbed in connection with Grantees' construction, reconstruction, maintenance, operation or removal activities under this Easement Agreement or the exercise of any other rights of Grantees under this Easement Agreement or the operation of any facilities, improvements or other items installed, constructed or placed by Grantees on the property. Grantees hereby agree to indemnify and hold Grantor harmless from and against any and all damages, liabilities, claims and expenses, including but not limited to attorney's fees incurred by or asserted against Grantor which arise out of any personal injury or death or property

damage arising out of any of Grantees' construction, reconstruction, maintenance, operation, removal or restoration activities under this Easement Agreement or the exercise of any other rights of Grantees under this Easement Agreement or the operation of any facilities, improvements or other items installed, constructed or placed by Grantees on the Property.

Grantees shall pay Grantor an annual easement fee of One Thousand Six Hundred Sixty-four and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,664.00). The fee shall be paid for one (1) year in full at the time the easement is executed and annually thereafter on the anniversary date of the execution of the easement. In the event the easement is not used for a full year, the annual fee will be prorated to a daily rate and any unused portion shall be refunded to the Grantees.

Any disputes arising under this Easement Agreement shall be settled either by commencement of a suit in Oakland County Circuit Court or by compulsory arbitration, at the election of the Grantor. The Grantees shall advise the Grantor of any dispute it has arising out of the Agreement and shall demand that the Grantor elect whether the dispute is to be resolved by submitted it to compulsory arbitration or by commencement of a suit in Oakland County Circuit Court. The Grantor shall make its election in writing within thirty (30) day from the receipt of such notice. If the Grantor elects to have the dispute resolved by compulsory arbitration, it shall be settled pursuant to Chapter 50 of the Revised Judicature Act for the State of Michigan, with each of the parties appointing one arbitrator and the two appointed appointing a third. A Judgment of any Circuit Court may be rendered upon the arbitrator's award. In the event the Grantees fail to make such an election, and dispute between the parties may be resolved by the filing of a suit in Oakland County Circuit Court.

The parties may terminate the Temporary Construction Easement by written mutual consent signed by all parties or pursuant to its termination one year after issuance.

THIS GRANT IS hereby declared to be binding upon the agents, lessees, and licensees of the parties hereto.

This transfer is exempt from the Real Estate Transfer Tax pursuant to MCL 207 .505(a) and from the State Real Estate Transfer Tax pursuant to MCL 207.526(a).





No Time for 18 Holes of Golf? Let's Play Five

More courses are experimenting with offerings that are shorter and cheaper than the traditional 18-hole round

Like many golf courses, Canal Shores had seen fewer rounds played in recent years. The century-old course north of Chicago was projecting another downturn this year when, in the spring, its management group began to think about how it could reverse the trend.

On a map, the par-60 course is laid out like most others in the U.S., an 18-hole route that takes players away from the clubhouse and back. But as officials looked closer, they saw two smaller groups of holes that could work the same way: a 10-hole loop and a 5-hole loop.

Canal Shores now sells those shorter-format rounds at discounted rates.

"There are a lot of people who are time-starved, but they still want to play golf," said Dan Bulf, the course's business manager.

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In a nod to that reality, more publicaccess courses across the U.S. are experimenting with offerings that are shorter and cheaper than the traditional 18-hole round. The shift comes amid a multi-year push by golf organizations to convince people that playing the sport

does not necessarily require a time commitment of four or five hours.

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The most common alternative is the nine-hole round, but some courses are offering quicker options or even pay-by-the-hole pricing. They are typically available only at off-peak times, such as late afternoons or weekday mornings. But the fact that they are available at all represents a change among course operators, a fragmented group of small businesses not known for their innovative thinking.

"The rate of adoption in golf is glacial for anything that happens," said Jim Koppenhaver, president of industry consultant Pellucid. "But I think it's resonating. It's a slow sea change."

The reasons for that change are no mystery. Though golf remains among the most widely played sports in the U.S., the number of people who play at least once a year has dropped steadily from 30 million in 2005 to 24 million in 2016.

Surveys have consistently shown that the amount of time a traditional round of golf takes is among the chief reasons for the decline. There is also growing evidence that if golf courses themselves don't create alternative forms of the sport, people will find it elsewhere.

Topgolf, a cross between a high-tech driving range, sports bar and nightclub, attracted more than 10 million people to its facilities last year, more than double the number it drew just two years earlier. It has 30 U.S. locations spread across 16 states, with plans to add up to eight more by the end of this year.

"The golfer is looking for alternative ways to be a part of the game," said Jeff Foster, senior vice president of the tee-time booking service GolfNow, which for the past several years has been encouraging courses to offer more nine-hole rates.

Some of the proposed alternatives have been more outlandish. Among the experiments courses have tried to lure young and beginner golfers in recent years are 15-inch-diameter holes, more than triple the standard size; foot golf, in which players try to advance a soccer ball from tee to hole in as few kicks as they can; and the GolfBoard, which replaces the golf cart with a bag-carrying vehicle resembling an electric skateboard.

But the idea that the major golf bodies view as both the most practical and the most promising is far less radical. It's golf, at whatever length you have time for.

In 2014, the U.S. Golf Association launched a marketing campaign called Play9 that aims to promote the virtues of the nine-hole round to golfers, non-golfers and course owners alike. The USGA estimated that nine-hole rounds in 2016 comprised about one-third of total rounds played, with interest coming primarily from women, casual players and golfers under age 55.

There are even emerging options for people who don't have time for nine holes. QuickGolf, which launched last year, lets golfers pay by the hole at whichever times courses allow it, based on when standard tee times go unfilled. It runs largely on the honor system, with some safeguards to prevent golfers from playing more than they pay for.

Harvey Silverman, a longtime industry consultant who co-founded QuickGolf, said it has been adopted by 36 courses in 10 states. But he said expansion has been slowed by the inherent skepticism with which many course operators view alternative pricing structures.

"It's real tough for these guys to get their heads past, 'If it's not an 18-hole round of golf, then I don't want to think about it," Silverman said. "Well, you have to start thinking about it. Times have changed. It's not 1925 anymore."

Foster, of GolfNow, said course operators have expressed concern that more nine-hole rounds would merely mean a loss of revenue, offering a cheaper option for people who would otherwise play 18. GolfNow argues that they are incremental rounds, luring people who would otherwise not play. It recommends that courses sell nine-hole rounds for 62% of their 18-hole rate.

At Canal Shores—where, before he starred in "Caddyshack," Bill Murray once worked as a caddie—the impact of the shorter loops remains to be seen.

Mike Matthews, a 39-year-old regular at Canal Shores, often plays five holes with his 10-year-old son, whereas he said they would be unlikely to play 18 or even nine holes. "With him still learning and not being able to drive the ball, five holes is enough for us," Matthews said. But the logistics of playing five are more conducive to slower times of day, since the five-hole loop starts at the 14th hole, meaning Matthews and his son wait for gaps between groups playing 18.

Bulf, the business manager, said the response from golfers has been overwhelmingly positive. The shorter loops now account for 20% of weekday morning rounds played. But the question of whether they represent revenue gained or revenue lost remains unanswered.

Either way, Bulf said, "We definitely think this is a trend in the industry that's not going to go away."
