AGENDA ITEM #1 – Approve Resolution of Recommendation of City of Birmingham 2018 Parks and Recreation Master Plan

Sarah Traxler, McKenna Associates representative reviewed the below changes that included:

- **Mapping** Throughout the document's maps, correct the misspelled "Springdale Golf Course" and add the Ice Sports Arena to Kenning Park on all relevant maps.
- **Page 21** Remove the sentence "Park bond funds in the amount of \$3 million were used for these improvements", per the Parks and Recreation Board's recommendation during your last meeting.
- **Page 23** Remove the word "historical" from the references to the Birmingham Museum Master Landscape Plan.
- Page 31 Crop the photograph in the upper left-hand corner.
 Page 38 Lincoln Hills Golf Course has two paragraphs repeated; the last one will be deleted. With the deletion of the final paragraph, the section will be as intended.
- **Page 51** The levels in the table have a handful of typos, to be corrected thusly:
- Level 1 (no proposed change): "The park is not accessible to people with a broad range of physical disabilities. The site includes little paved areas and the facilities such as play equipment or picnic areas are not easily accessible."
- Level 2 (no proposed change) "The park is somewhat accessible to people with a broad range of physical disabilities. Either the parking area or pathways are paved, but not both. Many of the facilities such as play equipment or picnic areas are not easily accessible."
- Level 3 "The park is mostly accessible to people with a broad range of physical disabilities. Most of the parking areas and pathways are paved, and some of the facilities such as play equipment or picnic areas are accessible, but may not be completely barrier-free.
- Level 4 "The park is completely accessible to people with a broad range of physical disabilities. Parking areas and pathways area paved, and most of the facilities such as play equipment or picnic areas area easily accessible."
- Level 5 (no proposed change): "The entire park was developed or renovated using the principles of universal design, a design approach which enables all environments to be usable by everyone, the greatest extent possible, regardless of age, ability, or situation."
- **Page 86** Add the preparation of the Poppleton Park Concept Plan as an accomplishment during 2012 2017.
- Page 87 Add #1 and #2 footnotes from prior pages.
- Accepted Concept Plans, Etc. To create a comprehensive document and record related to parks and recreation in Birmingham, we propose to include all accepted or approved concept plans and master plans related to parks and recreation, not just those that were prepared since the 2012 plan was adopted.

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Sarah stated that more significantly the Commission discussed the Accessibility Ratings contained on pages 31 to 40 of the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Sarah stated that the Master Sub-Committee met to discuss the accessibility ratings after Sarah performed additional detailed site observation following an inventory and inspection checklist for each of the 26 parks contained within the Birmingham parks system. Based on Sarah's findings from additional detailed observations and fieldwork, the accessibility ratings have been updated in the Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

Sarah stated the topic of future grant applications to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (MDNR) was raised. Sarah stated that she was questioned whether additional points would be granted from bringing a low-scoring park up to a higher score.

Sarah stated with discussions with the MDNR representative that covers SE Michigan, Sarah found that a community would not score higher just by nature of improving its accessibility rating. However, if a community's park improvement that is the subject of the application is explicitly designed to increase accessibility (especially to the standards of universal design), there are points that may be given for that purposeful and deliberate accessibility improvement.

Sarah stated that the Parks and Recreation Master Plan will be presented at the March 26, 2018 City Commission meeting.

It was moved by Ryan Ross, seconded by John Rusche to recommend the adoption of the City of Birmingham 5 Year 2018 Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

COMMUNICATION/DISCUSSION ITEM #1 Barnum Park Prescribed Burn Carrie stated on April 13, 2017, at Barnum Park, the native planting beds were treated with a prescribed burn.

Carrie stated that the purpose of prescribed burns is to allow the native species to thrive and lessen the impact of invasive species, since native species have adapted to withstand the heat of the fire while the others have not. Native plants actually grow more vigorously after a burn.

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Carrie stated that David Boreman LLC has extended the pricing from last year. Carrie stated that a notification letter will be sent to neighboring residents, social media and website communication methods will also be used.

Carrie stated the fire department is aware of this project and will have a truck assigned to monitor work.

Carrie stated that the City of Birmingham hopes to expand this program in the future to other natural areas in the City including Quarton Lake and Booth Park.

Cindy Rose stated that the prescribed burn is an excellent idea. No Action was taken by the Parks and Recreation Board

On November 15, 2017, the Public Arts Board (PAB) reviewed and subsequently recommended approval for the loan of the Robert Lobe sculpture *Eastern Hophornbeam*. The Hill Gallery originally proposed this piece as a replacement for the Dennis Oppenheim sculpture, *Sound Heart*, which was removed from its location at the Baldwin Public Library (BPL) southwest lawn.

On December 18, 2017, the Library Board formally reviewed the *Eastern Hophornbeam*, stated their concerns about the sculpture in relation to its context and scale with the library's design, and ultimately voted to reject *Eastern Hophornbeam*.

Following the meeting, staff discussed with Hill Gallery the options regarding the proposed loan. The gallery owner Mr. Hill has expressed an interest in the following locations:

- 1. Booth Park along Booth Park Trail
- 2. Barnum Park (no specific location but a site that the Board and Community for Barnum Park recommends)
- 3. Shain Park (potentially at a corner that is currently not overwhelmed with competing structures)

Mr. Hill has also indicated that he does not have a strong preference over any location in the City and would be happy to let the PAB decide where to place it. He also stressed the importance of placing it somewhere with ample foot and or vehicular traffic.

On January 17, 2018 the Public Arts Board discussed potential locations for the *Eastern Hophornbeam.* They voted for Booth Park as their number one priority due to its proximity to the trail, forest, and Old Woodward, with the exact location to be determined later. The Public Arts Board has yet to place a sculpture in Booth Park, and would like to have it visible from Old Woodward.

On March 21st, 2018 it was brought to the Public Arts Board's attention that there are a number of potential new projects planned for Booth Park, and the approved location may conflict with park activities. The Board decided to keep Booth Park as their number one priority. If this space was not approved, it was decided that Barnum Park is their second priority for placement of the sculpture, with its exact location to be determined. There was consensus from the Board that

Barbara Heller and Anne Ritchie would meet to determine recommended locations within each park.

On March 28th, 2018 members of the Public Arts Board met with City staff to determine recommended locations in each park. Aerial images and photos of the area have been provided that indicate the proposed placements for *Eastern Hophornbeam* in both Booth Park and Barnum Park.





ROBERT LOBE Nature as Effigy

The New York City Department of Parks and Recreation's public art program has consistently fostered the creation and installation of temporary public art throughout the five boroughs. Robert Lobe recently joined a long list of distinguished artists who have exhibited in Brooklyn's Prospect Park, among them, Roxy Paine and Mark di Suvero. But, how many of these artists have told a story so valuable?

In the 19th century, Frederick Law Olmsted and Calvert Vaux gained widespread acclaim for co-designing many well-known urban parks, among them Central Park and Prospect Park. Olmsted arrived at his practice after working as a reporter in the Antebellum South, where he witnessed war's devastating effect on nature. His design criteria aimed to uphold natural conditions rather than to appease the cultural will to control and, ultimately, to destroy. Lobe's three-part sculptural series, "Nature in Nature," reinforced the ideas of Olmsted's natural landscape.

Lobe has been working as a sculptor since the 1960s, when in an effort to disrupt Minimalism, he scattered shards of metal, rubber, wood, and rope on the floor. The Whitney Museum featured one of these scatter pieces in the 1969 exhibition "Anti-Illusion: Procedures/Materials," along with works by Carl Andre, Lynda Benglis, Robert Morris, Bruce Nauman, Richard Serra, and Keith Sonnier, among others. According to Lobe, "Organizing the scatter pieces...permitted variability and implied motion. Today I realize how closely these assemblies resemble the detritus where I forage for ideas in nature."

In the early '70s, Lobe began looking directly to nature, first in the "Stone Clones," a series of large-scale, extrapolated portraits of stones in hollow, laminated wood structures. He then moved to hammering aluminum around construction materials from the World Trade Center, found in the Battery Park landfill. Lobe chose aluminum "because of its artificial and industrial association, distinctly opposite that of weathered wood." Both bodies of work were exhibited at Dag Hammarskjöld Plaza in 1977.

Subsequently, the process of *repoussé* allowed him to work outdoors. In the solitude of the Adirondacks and on the Appa-

lachian Trail, along the coast of Nova Scotia, he found new freedom and a personal transcendence. Since then, he has worked in a number of natural environments: "It was possibly my memory coupled with those wild landscapes that made my connection to nature more profound."


Lobe describes his process as first wandering around in the woods, then choosing the trees that he will trace. He hammers the sheet metal around trunk and branches with fasteners that leave the joints exposed; seams and bolts remain visible so that viewers can peer inside and see that the object is hollow. So, what might appear excessively heavy is relatively light, and by drawing attention to the gap between the real thing and the image, the artifice is exposed. The sculptor transforms nature into a facsimile, a death mask or an effigy of the natural form.

Lobe's works mimic the natural, while their industrial materiality brings to mind something out of George Miller's post-apocalyptic film *Road Warrior*, a world where nature has been poisoned by humanity's ravaging abuses. As such, the sculptures act as a memento mori, part of a tradition in art dating back to antiquity and always sharing the same purpose, to remind man of his mortality.

In "Inside/Outside: Treelines," a group show at Abington Art Center in 2006. Lobe's large, outdoor work Metamorphosis and the indoor Angel created a profound scenario focusing on artifice and how nature has been altered. Lobe's aesthetic is lowkey; his work doesn't try to muscle its way into our field of vision. It looks at home in a natural setting, but it also sets up a situation in which you detect its harmony, as well as its departure from the place in which you find it. Libby Rosof, writing on theartblog.org, says, "Robert Lobe's beaten aluminum tree sheaths look like body armor for the trees. His pieces are also a reminder of the gargantuan scale of trees while the surfaces and shapes evoke elephant skin."

Lobe belongs to an American tradition of artists whose work attempts to mirror the beauty of nature and human impact on the land. While 19th-century painters such as Thomas Cole, Albert Bierstadt, and Thomas Moran depicted nature in its pristine grandeur, photographers of the same era, including A.J. Russell, Carleton

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Watkins, and W.H. Jackson, not only captured the beauty of the wilderness frontier, but, in documenting human progress, also recorded the damage caused by mass migrations to the West. By the middle of the 20th century, with countless remnants of destruction apparent in and out of American cities, artists like Robert Smithson and photojournalist Eugene Smith attempted to highlight the urgent necessity to restore balance to and understand the ecological relations conjoining humanity, industry, and the natural environment.

When I visited Prospect Park with Lobe, a man was fishing in the lake, where *Invisible Earth* was installed. The fisherman, who defined his sport as catch and release, said that bass are best found near a sheltering object such as the sculpture. In order to install this work, Lobe donned a wetsuit and dove into the Lullwater to make the footings — but the finished work appeared to float.

Just south of Prospect Park's 19th-century boathouse, on a grassy triangular intersection near a massive and ancient Camperdown elm (a variety immune to the Dutch elm disease that wiped out nearly all elms in North America), stood another of Lobe's hammered aluminum sculptures -Antique Jenny. The close proximity of the elm (nature) and the aluminum effigy (culture) made the contrast particularly strong. According to Lobe, "The idea of Antique Jenny grew out of contemplation of transcendentalism and the industrial revolution when the steam engine tore through the natural landscape." The third and largest of Lobe's three sculptures, Nature's Clock, perched on a hillock mimicking the sloped terrain.

The stylized forms of these works evoke the idea of archaic monuments ravaged by time. Their distinct location in the present, or even in some imaginary dystopian future, restructures the eternal dialectic of "man and nature" through artifacts made of reconstructed materials.

Recently, the Hudson Valley Center for Contemporary Art in Peekskill, New York, hosted an exhibition of three works on

which Lobe collaborated with his wife, painter Kathleen Gilje. In Kindred Spirits (2009), Appalachian Forest (2010), and Woodbury Quarry (2011), Lobe's photographic documentation of his sites is transformed by Gilje into grisaille paintings and framed within a sculptural relief hammered out on rocks and trees from the places where the photographs were made. Lobe says, "We chose grisaille because its richness of grays is enhanced by the play of light in the monochromatic luster of hammered aluminum. But primarily, we wanted to interpret the exact same elements of the same place seen through the eyes of a painter and a sculptor." Lobe's work began as an effort to go past formal issues but migrated into another, more personal and spiritual realm based on a love of nature and a need to memorialize it in the face of inevitable destruction.

Attached is a proposal from Mr. Oz Forrester requesting outdoor pickleball courts to be installed at City of Birmingham Parks.

Mr. Forrester submitted a pickleball request to the Parks and Recreation Board at the April 12, 2017 Parks and Recreation Board meeting, (exhibit A) which was discussed and forward to the Parks and Recreation Master Plan Sub-Committee as stated in the April 12, 2017 Parks and Recreation Board Minutes, (exhibit B).

Pickleball is identified in the DRAFT Parks and Recreation Master Plan, "Chapter 6 Action Plan, page 84 under Table 8: Five-Year Capital Improvement Plan, Park Enhancements to explore (Locations TBD)," (exhibit C).

The Parks and Recreation Master Plan was adopted at the March 26, 2018 City Commission meeting.

Suggested Resolution: To request the Administration pursue the evaluation of the existing tennis courts including usage and potential viable location for pickleball in Birmingham. In addition, during the investigation include associated costs for modification to existing tennis courts and the overall global impact of such change, in keeping with such items proposed as part of the action plan from the 2018 Parks and Recreation Master Plan.

PICKLEBALL in BIRMINGHAM

Proposed pickleball facilities in Birmingham. Revised 3/12/18

Pickleball is a popular racquet sport, but we don't have enough courts. At NEXT, more than 60 people play at various times on the <u>single</u> temporary pickleball court in a gym shared with Midvale school, so availability is on a limited basis. 16 to 20 people are often waiting to play when it <u>is</u> available.

To provide enough <u>outdoor</u> courts to accommodate this many active senior pickleball players, let's convert a 2-court tennis venue into a 6-court pickleball venue. Trade 8 player max for 24 and offer open drop-in play every day.

A site such as Crestview Park on Southfield Rd offers ample parking, a water fountain, exact surface size & fencing to accommodate 6 pickleball courts. Streets and parkland separate courts from residences to help avoid conflict.

Birmingham is rich in leisure activity opportunities with a 26 public parks plus Quarton Lake and the woodchip path along the Rouge River. Sport/recreation areas, in addition to school property that is open to the public, include baseball/softball diamonds, Ice Arena, skate park, two 9-hole golf courses, 16 tennis courts, Birmingham Racquet Club, Forest Hills Swim Club, fitness clubs/gyms, NEXT and even a dog park.

Pickleball is a fast growing racquet sport that combines skills of platform & traditional tennis, played on a 20x44 foot court using a paddle & plastic whiffle ball. Origin of the name is debated! The national pickleball association is USAPA & the local group is SMPA, Southwest Michigan Pickleball Association which started in Royal Oak.

Beverly Hills, Rochester, Troy, Royal Oak & other communities have either or both outdoor & indoor pickleball courts. Birmingham has one pickleball court open to the public at NEXT in a gym shared with a grade school so access is limited. The Ice Arena offered courts Jun 1 thru Aug 1. These temporary courts are greatly appreciated, but do not address the need for all-season courts.




The most cost-effective method is to convert this existing 2-court tennis surface into a 6-court pickleball venue.

Exterior fencing is perfect for pickleball. This conversion will permit a potential of 24 pickleball players v 8 for tennis.







Bill asked Lauren if there has been any contact from the City of Birmingham Planning Board regarding parking available in the Kenning Parking lot across from the proposed Lincoln Yard bistro.

Bill stated that he understands that the current plan for Lincoln Yard really uses all of the available parking including parking for their neighbor on the west side but if Lincoln Yard expands as they plan to have roof seating there will be a great lack of parking on their proposed facility and they would have to utilize parking elsewhere and they have made no contact with the Department of Public Services about what the current usage is of Kenning Parking lot and believe the Kenning Parking lot is pretty well used up most of the year.

Bill stated that Lincoln Yard although it is nice to have a bistro they need to provide their own parking and not utilize the public parking at Kenning and that the City of Birmingham Commission should be made aware of the utilization of the Kenning Parking when the city commission reviews this for possible inclusion as one of the bistros that the city commission is going to allow this year.

Therese stated that when the bistro ordinance was first brought forth it was a way to try to reenergize what were many vacant spaces in the downtown and it was envision for the downtown where people used meter parking and decks. Therese stated that this would be a new use of it in a place that doesn't have necessarily metered parking.

Parks and Recreation Board Meeting 4/12/2017

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Therese stated that bistro ordinance requires that bistros provide parking based on the interior space and that there is a calculation based on square footage and a ratio that the planning board uses and it does not count seats or employees it just counts square footage.

Therese stated to Bill that the calculation only counts the interior square footage and the bistro ordinance does not require bistros to provide parking for the outdoor spaces or the roof top space.

Therese stated according to the Eccentric article of March 10, 2017 that was provided in our packet the inside seating will be 65 and the potential outdoor spaces are 132 so that is double of the inside space. Therese stated that the parking is a concern that if the bistro was full on a busy night they could have more demand of parking.

Therese stated that there are activities that occur at Kenning Park involving the Birmingham Ice Arena, Birmingham Little League, Birmingham Racquet Club and the Forest Hill Swim Club have activities that occur during the same time as the hours of the proposed bistro.

Therese stated that when the Forest Hill Swim Club has meets or when the Birmingham Ice Arena host hockey tournaments and the annual ice show overflow parking would go onto Lincoln.

Therese stated the parking is a concern that needs to be brought to the city commission's attention and that the Parks and Recreation Board would like more information about how the bistro is going to accommodate those extra parking spaces that there not currently required to accommodate without infringing on parking that is meant for sports activities.

Bill stated that on the last statement of page one of the article it states, "I think this is a great and I think it's going to do really well, "Boyce said. "But by far this is the biggest bistro we're going to have... the idea of a bistro is a smaller establishment – and this isn't it."

Bill states that this is not a bistro and that one member of the planning board has acknowledged that it is not a bistro.

Joey Kummer stated that one potential solution that the bistro could have would be to reduce the outdoor seating and that the extra space could be used for additional parking.

Therese stated that could be a potential solution but the City Commission would have to recommend that.

SUBJECT: Consulting Services for Kenning Park Field Improvements

The City of Birmingham and the Birmingham Little League (BLL) entered into a Donation Agreement on December 11, 2017 in the amount of \$303,000 for improvements as it relates to Fields #2 and #3 at Kenning Park. The Donation Agreement has been signed by both parties and the amount of \$303,000 has been received by the City from BLL.

A Kenning Park Master Plan was prepared by The Johnson Hill Land Ethics Studio (JHLE) during 2013 and received by the City Commission at their March 24, 2014 meeting. Plus, in advance of the parking lot project the City hired The Johnson Hill Land Ethics Studio (JHLE) for landscape architectural services as it relates to Kenning Park Parking Lot improvements.

The request by the Birmingham Little League was to contribute to the improvements of the two existing fields on the easterly edge of the park property. This renovation to the two fields referred to fields 2 and 3 will include some of the following field improvements; they will be in their current location, they will be rotated to achieve optimal positioning and layout, infield grass construction, irrigation, new fencing, grading/shaping and other site enhancements for the reconfiguration of the existing two 200 foot fields.

The City hired Nowak & Fraus Engineers to perform a boundary, topographic and tree survey for Kenning Park, which is close to being finalized. The new survey will be incorporated into the existing property survey. This survey will then allow JHLE to prepare a final design, construction drawings and bid documents for the two field enhancements.

Based on the extensive knowledge and work experience JHLE has with Kenning Park over the years and in order to provide for a seamless transition for the necessary scope of services to perform Phase II of the Donation Agreement, we solicited a proposal from JHLE for this project. Phase II provides for the City, after receipt of the funds, to undertake construction drawing and bid specifications for the bidding of the project. JHLE provided a proposal for design development, construction documentation, bidding period services and construction project management services for an amount not to exceed \$24,700. We would proceed one step at a time with them and can stop work at any given time, to pay for only work performed, based on the conditions of the Donation Agreement.

Phase I of the Donation Agreement was prepared by JHLE which provided for a draft redesign of fields 2 and 3 and preliminary cost estimates of about \$152,000 per field. After such time the City met with BLL to prepare and finalize the Donation Agreement for presentation to the City Commission.

If the project is awarded, after bids are received, we anticipate construction to begin after the 2018 baseball season ends and all uses of the City fields at Kenning Park conclude. Based on the proposed schedule, it is the plan to have the two renovated fields ready for play for the start of the 2019 season.

The term for the consulting Agreement between JHLE and the City of Birmingham for these services will have an end date of May 31, 2019. This will afford ample time for all final punch list items to be completed and any final project payments for the work performed by the selected Contractor.

The City Commission at their March 26, 2018 meeting approved proceeding with JHLE for landscape architectural consultant services as outlined above. We intend to provide periodic updates to the Parks and Recreation Board via the Kenning Park Field Sub-Committee which is comprised of Ryan Ross and Bill Wiebrecht.
