he welcome arrival of spring brings anticipation for projects and activities soon to be underway in Birmingham. After the lengthy planning process, we can now look forward to seeing projects come to fruition as we enhance our wonderful city.

The South Old Woodward Phase 3 project between Brown and Landon will begin by early June. Scheduled infrastructure improvements will pave the way for a safer and aesthetically pleasing experience for pedestrians and vehicles. See page 9 for detailed information about this project.

As an avid walker throughout Birmingham, and given the vehicle-pedestrian accidents that occurred last year, pedestrian safety is a significant concern of mine and something I take very seriously. We continue to work toward making Woodward Avenue safer for pedestrians, cyclists, and the motoring public by calming speeds, reducing lanes, adding more green landscape and improvements, and making crossings safer. It is our hope that we will see the Woodward Avenue road diet in Birmingham and we are in the process of working with MDOT to achieve that goal. As we work to improve the experience for those traveling through Birmingham, our efforts extend to those who utilize the City's parking structures. The addition of the parking manager position has already proved advantageous with shorter wait times, new illuminated structure signage, and research underway for new parking structure equipment that will create an easy-in, easy-out experience for all. In addition to the aforementioned scheduled improvements throughout the City, an extensive renovation project recently concluded at the Birmingham Ice Arena. I encourage you to stop by the beautiful facility to see the improvements, and learn about new arena features and technology on page 5. Residents made this project possible when they approved the Parks and Recreation Bond, which will also fund improvements at Adams Park, the addition of pickleball courts and more.

In an effort to meet the needs of the community in the most efficient way possible, we recently initiated the implementation of a citizen request app, GovAlert. The app enables the community to submit a concern or question to the City in seconds. If you have not already done so, I encourage you to take advantage of the free mobile app for expedited service.

With cautious optimism about the easing pandemic, we are pleased to bring back treasured community events this spring and summer. This newsletter has all the details regarding the Department of Public Services Open House, the Celebrate Birmingham Hometown Parade, In the Park Summer Concerts, Movie Nights and more. 
COVID-19 UPDATES

COVID-19 UPDATES — CITY SERVICES, MEETINGS & MORE

At the time of this publication, masks are required in City offices and the City Hall lobby remains accessible to the public through the Martin Street entrance on the north side of City Hall during regular business hours, Monday-Friday from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Visit www.bhamgov.org/contacts to view a list of department contact numbers for services needed.

Most City forms, applications and pament submissions are available at www.bhamgov.org/formsandpayments, and may also be submitted 24/7 via the drop boxes on the south side of City Hall.

City Commission and other City boards meet in-person with a virtual option available to the public. Individuals who would like to attend meetings in person can access City Hall from the Martin Street entrance during normal business hours, 8 a.m.-5 p.m. For meetings that occur after hours, visitors can access City Hall through the Police



Department lobby entrance on Pierce Street. Members of the public who prefer to attend meetings virtually may learn how to participate at www.bhamgov.org/participate. You may also watch many City meetings on your local cable access channel and by webstreaming on the City's Vimeo channel.

WHAT'S NEW

NEW PARKING STRUCTURE EQUIPMENT COMING SOON

Big changes are in the works at Birmingham's parking structures. The City

recently hired a parking systems manager, Ryan Weingartz, who is evaluating the current system and will soon recommend new equipment for all five of the city's structures.

Concerns with the current parking structure equipment include: traffic backups, loss of internet connection, long response time for those requesting assistance, long monthly permit wait list, capacity issues, and the equipment is not user-friendly. New cloud-based, maintenance-free equipment being considered offers user-friendly, contactless entry with options such as text to pay, scan a QR code to pay, pre-purchase passes, etc. The City's goal is to create an easyin, easy-out experience for all parkers.



Downtown Infrastructure Improvements Set to Continue During 2022 South Old Woodward Reconstruction Phase 3 Project

Downtown infrastructure improvements will continue this year with the South Old Woodward Reconstruction Phase 3 project between Brown and Landon. It is a continuation of the work completed in 2018 on other areas along Old Woodward, and in 2020 on Maple.

The reconstruction project will result in new underground infrastructure and new streetscape between Brown and Landon. Construction will begin in late May or early June.

Design features will include:

- Curb bumpouts at each intersection to improve crosswalks for pedestrians, mid-block crosswalks, raised planter beds and landscape features.
- Enhancements such as: exposed aggregate concrete, granite bench seating areas and new streetlights.
- Improved on-street accessible parking spaces, each served with an individual sidewalk ramp to improve conditions for those needing accommodations.



ASPHALT RESURFACING PROGRAM UPDATE

This spring and summer work will continue on the Asphalt Resurfacing Program. Last year, crews focused on completing asphalt repairs and trench maintenance for water and sewer taps throughout the city. This year, crews will complete localized repairs on Adams Road, south of the bridge to Maple. Asphalt resurfacing will occur on the following street sections: Latham - Saxon to Northlawn, Stanley - Lincoln to 14 Mile, Stanley -Hanna to Wallace, Watkins - Brown to Frank, and Watkins - Hanna to Wallace.



CAPE SEAL PROGRAM UPDATE

Cape seal is a two-stage roadway surface treatment that provides unimproved roads with a moisture-resistant seal and a smoother driving surface. The process involves rolling stone chips into a layer of liquid asphalt emulsion, followed later by an application of a slurry micro-surface. The Department of Public Services maintains nearly 26 miles of unimproved roadways through cape seal surface treatment. The next round of cape seal application will take place on the following streets this year: Taunton, Melton (between Taunton and Eton), Humphrey, Banbury, Penistone, Sheffield (between Woodward and Eton), Croft, and Bradford (between Eton and Emmons). CITYWIDE MASTER PLAN FOR 2040

The Citywide Master Plan for 2040 will shape the future of Birmingham for the next 20 years.

After an extensive public review and engagement process, the Planning Board recently wrapped up a second draft review. A joint meeting of the City Commission and Planning Board will be held this spring to finalize the second draft and authorize distribution of the plan for review by entities required by state planning law.

BIRMINGHAM GREEN

Rain gardens help protect our nearby water bodies by storing and filtering water back into the ground. For a modest 1,500-square-foot home, as much as 5,000 gallons of water from a 1-inch rainstorm can run off the roof, driveway, patio and even lawns. A simple, low maintenance and easy to construct rain garden can capture much of that runoff, similar to how the natural environment would function. Without a rain garden, urban rainwater runoff goes into storm pipes, or ditches, both of which can go straight to natural water bodies such as the Rouge River or Quarton Lake. Rain gardens not only filter water, they replenish the groundwater with clean, cool water.



The City of Birmingham is making a push to include rain gardens in municipal projects on public land, which creates dual-purpose areas that contribute to beautification and serve an infrastructure function. Keep an eye out for new rain gardens planned at Adams Park and along S. Old Woodward as a part of their reconstruction projects.



SEASONAL RENOVATIONS

As we say farewell to the snow and welcome back the beautiful Michigan colors, you may find yourself ready to shake off the cabin fever from enduring another long winter. If you are also looking to test all of that HGTV knowledge that you acquired during hibernation (and likely a couple of quarantines), please do not run to the lumberyard or home im-





- · Patios, deck and pergolas are all popular spring projects that seem simple enough but actually require a lot of planning. A zoning review is required to confirm that setbacks are maintained, the maximum allowable lot coverage is not exceeded and your project meets our minimum open space requirements. Though patios are generally applied for as an impervious surface project, if you are also installing steps and railings, a building permit is required instead.
- · Driveway installations DO require a permit even if you are just replacing the existing one without making any changes to the footprint. We need to verify that minimum open space is maintained and in compliance with the Zoning Ordinance.
- · A drainage review may be required depending on the scope of work and the proximity to property lines. This review identifies potential flooding risks to neighboring properties.
- · Any proposed exterior changes for commercial, multi-family or historic properties require approval from the Planning Department prior to review from the Building Department.

We are here to help!

The Building Department has permit technicians, plan reviewers and inspectors here to help you understand and navigate construction codes, State regulations and City Ordinances. POLICE DEPARTMENT

As we enter the warmer months, the Birmingham Police Department would like to remind you to be aware of the increase in alternative modes of transportation while you are driving around town.

While we all enjoy getting outside and enjoying the spring weather, when driving we must remember to

yield the right of way to pedestrians. This includes people walking, jogging, hiking, skate-boarding, pushing strollers and more. Keep an eye out for pedestrians when entering a street from a driveway or alley, at stop signs, traffic signals, crosswalks and intersections.

At crosswalks located at intersections that are controlled by traffic signals, pedestrians must follow the direction of pedestrian crossing signals and/or the traffic signals in the event no crossing signals are installed.

Some confusion exists at mid-block crossings when crosswalks are located at places that vehicular traffic flow is not controlled. In these situations, the Michigan Uniform Traffic Code states:

When traffic-control signals are not in place, or are not in operation, the driver of a vehicle shall

The Cities Multi-Modal Transportation Board (MMTB) reviews all road improvements to ensure they are multi-modal friendly with everyone's safety in mind. yield the right-of-way (slowing down or stopping if need be to so yield) to a pedestrian crossing the roadway within a crosswalk when the pedestrian is on the half of the roadway on which the vehicle is traveling. Or, when the pedestrian is approaching so closely from the opposite half of the roadway as to be in danger. A pedestrian shall not suddenly leave a curb or other place of safety and walk or run into a path of a vehicle that is so close that it is impossible for the driver to yield.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

GIVE BACK TO YOUR LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT



Did you know you can donate your home or commercial business that is going to be demolished for essential firefighter training exercises? Training inside a home enables firefighters to witness first hand not only what it's like to be in a home filled with (simulated) smoke, but also several other fire safety and rescue situations. These exercises are great for teaching:

- · Real-world scenarios, like search-and-rescue
- · How to size up a fire
- · Best ways to advance hose lines through an area
- · Roof operations and ventilation procedures
- · Firefighter survival emergency wall breach maneuver

Your project will not be held up by donating your home or commercial business. No real fire or smoke is used in the training process. Any amount of time helps, so donating becomes flexible to your schedule. Donating your house to the fire department for training helps firefighters save lives in a real-life situation. BIRMINGHAM MUSEUM

Calling all gardeners! Trade your perennial plants and divisions at Museum's heritage plant exchange June 4!

The Birmingham Museum has been working toward improving public access and improvements to the museum grounds in the past year, with the goal to reconstruct the character of the Allens' original gardens from 1926. The final phase involves planting the main garden bed with heritage perennial flowers, many of which are still available today, and found in local gardens. And because spring is the time for dividing and thinning perennials, the museum board has planned a fun event to invite the public to get in on the perennial garden project in a first-ever community Heritage Plant Exchange at the Birmingham Museum at 556 W. Maple Road.

From 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, June 4, the public is invited to bring a healthy plant (or two) to trade with others and/or place in the Allen House perennial garden. There is no charge for the exchange—leave a plant, take a plant. Get something new for your garden, and meet fellow green thumbers! Museum board member and master gardener Jay Shell will be on

hand to answer gardening questions, and the museum will be open for visitors (regular admission applies) during the event.

All plants must be labeled; blank labels will be available on site. AVOID FINES — KEEP GRASS, WEEDS BELOW 8 INCHES

Please be aware of Birmingham's grass and weed ordinance. We require your grass and weeds to be kept below 8 inches high. Poison ivy, ragweed or any other poisonous, noxious or unhealthy growths are prohibited. Access the entire Grass and Noxious Weed ordinance on the City's website at www.bhamgov.org/code.

BRUSH CHIPPING

The chipper truck resumed its routine cycle in April. It takes the chipper seven to 10 business days to cycle the city, depending on weather conditions (chipper doesn't run in the rain) and the volume of brush out for chipping.

Brush and limbs that are at least 4 feet long and up to 4-5 inches in diameter should be stacked at the curb with all of the cut ends going in the same direction.

AFFIX YARD WASTE DECAL TO CONTAINERS

Acceptable yard waste containers are trash cans with "yard waste" decals (decals available at City offices inside the Police Department entrance off of Pierce Street) or 30-gallon paper yard waste bags. Yard waste placed in plastic bags will not be collected. Yard waste containers must weigh less than 50 pounds and yard waste must be small enough (under 4 feet in length) to fit in the designated container.

Curbside collection is provided from Wednesday, April 6, through the third Friday in December.

BULKY ITEMS — CURBSIDE OR SPECIAL PICK-UP?

Wondering what items you can place at the curb and what items would require a "special pick-up" fee? Couches (under 8 feet), fridges (take doors off), stoves, washers, dryers, mattresses, box springs, carpeting (rolled and tied under 4 feet) and toilets are all acceptable items to place at your curb by 7 a.m. on your trash day (no additional fee required).

The following items require advanced notice and a fee to pick them up: Cast iron items such as tubs or sinks, hot tubs, trampolines, play structures, basketball metal hoops, pianos, chain link, wood and PVC fences, decks, sheds, roofing material, railroad ties and more than normal large amounts of trash (usually move outs). Please call Car Trucking at 586-791-8480 in advance to pay for and arrange pick-up of those items.

The City's offices will be closed on Friday, April 15, to observe Good Friday (normal refuse collection that day), and Monday, May 30, to observe Memorial Day (refuse collection delayed one day that week).
