### **Baldwin Public Library**

### **Holiday Closures**

The library will be closed for Memorial Day weekend from Saturday, May 25 through Monday, May 27. It will reopen on Tuesday, May 28 at 9 a.m.

The library will also be closed on Wednesday, June 19 in observance of the Juneteenth holiday.

### **Library Board**

The Library Board will meet on Monday, May 20 at 7:30 p.m. for its regular meeting. The board will be voting to withdraw interest earnings in the amount of \$58,897.97 from the Trust's Endowment Funds at the meeting. These funds will be used to pay for programs and services at the library.

### **Phase 3 Construction Project**

The Phase 3 addition and renovation is nearly complete and the library should reopen in early June. Tile installation of the main staircase is progressing well and most punch list items have been completed. The materials handling machine has been installed and is fully operational in its new location adjacent to the new front door. For the time being, visitors are welcome to enjoy our new outdoor terrace at the corner of Bates and Merrill streets. ## **The Birmingham Museum**

This month, the museum is hosting approximately 500 2nd grade students from Birmingham on their annual local history field trip. The program is specially designed to reflect curriculum standards, with a student-centered inquiry-based approach. Small groups of students tour each room of the Hunter House and museum staff interact with each group to encourage critical thinking and comparisons of the past with the present. This approach was developed to accommodate students' needs and learning styles that

## **Board of Zoning Appeals**

There was one case on the agenda for the April 16, 2024 Zoning Board of Appeals regular meeting:

1. 2694 Dorchester: The property owner requested a variance from the minimum distance between their proposed house and the neighbor's house on the west side to construct a new house with an attached garage. The request was approved and variance granted by a 6/0 vote.

#### **Mariah Trovato**

Mariah passed the International Code Council (ICC) Permit Technician Exam on May 10, 2024. ## **Calling All Election Inspectors!**

The City Clerk's Office is taking applications for election inspectors for the August 6, 2024 State Primary Election and the November 5, 2024 General Election. Individuals must be at least 16 years of age and a registered Michigan voter if over the age of 18.

Becoming an election inspector is a valuable opportunity to actively support our democratic process. As an election inspector, you play an essential role in ensuring fair and transparent elections, while safeguarding the rights of your fellow citizens. With training and experience, election inspectors build a deeper understanding of the election process and all of the safety and security measures in place to ensure that elections continue to be conducted with accuracy and efficiency in a safe manner.

In June, the Clerk's Office will reach out to inspectors who have served in previous elections. Training and placement notifications for the August election will take place throughout the month of July. Visit <a href="https://doi.org/vote">bhamgov.org/vote</a> for more information.


Early voting is a component of proposal 2022-2 and includes a Constitutional right to no less than 9 days of early voting in each Statewide and Federal election (even year election) for no less than 8 hours per day. Early voting will look and feel just like voting on election day.

## Becoming a Permanent Ballot Voter

Since the passage of Proposal 2022-2, clerks now maintain a Permanent Ballot List. Birmingham voters began opting into the Permanent Ballot List by checking a box on their November 7, 2023 absentee ballot application. This box is also available on the 2024 absentee ballot applications, pictured below.



Voters can opt in or out of the Permanent Ballot List at any time by sending a written request to the City Clerk's Office.

Voters on the Permanent Ballot List should make sure they keep current contact information on file with the City Clerk's Office including mailing address (especially for those who travel outside of Birmingham during times that ballots are being mailed) as well as phone and email contacts. Ballots are not allowed to be forwarded so the Clerk's Office will be contacting all voters whose absentee ballots bounced back to the Clerk's Office in the mail.

### No Postage Necessary!

Absentee ballot applications and absentee ballot return envelopes for the entire State of Michigan are equipped with a business reply mail permit that will cover the cost of postage for any ballot or application mailed within the United States.

## Return Envelopes - What to look out for

Outgoing absentee ballots (to the voter) are blue. All absentee ballot return envelopes (coming back to the Clerk) will be purple.

The City of Birmingham recently earned a gold seal of achievement in the 2024 Michigan Green Communities (MGC) Challenge. The statewide MGC challenge is an annual program that serves as a guide to help communities measure their progress towards sustainability. The current challenge recognizes actions taken through the 2023 calendar in areas such as energy efficiency, climate adaptation and resilience, recycling, environmental justice and more.

The City entered its first MGC Challenge two years ago, achieving silver status. Since then, the Birmingham City Commission's strategic goal to "position itself for a changing future by instituting policies and practices that protect the natural environment and reduce extreme weather impacts on the community" helped launch a series of actions that propelled Birmingham to a new level of commitment to sustainability that continues to grow. ## **Ad Hoc Aging in Place Committee (AIPC)**

On April 24, 2024, the AIPC held its regular meeting at City Hall. The AIPC received the first draft of the Community Survey results. The AIPC went over each category contained within the Community Survey and made comments about the results. The committee also discussed how the material was presented. City staff will facilitate the changes and respondents who indicated they would like a follow-up personal interview to discuss their Community Survey response were assigned to a committee member or City staff to complete. The AIPC also addressed all of the questions received from the public from the February 28, 2024 public engagement meeting.

The AIPC discussed the conflict on Wednesdays at 4 p.m. with the City's new Ad Hoc Senior/Recreation Center Committee. After debate, there was consensus to move the AIPC meeting to 1 p.m. on Wednesday, May 29, 2024 for the next regular scheduled meeting.

## YMCA Building (Ad Hoc Senior/Recreation Center Committee)

In the past month, City staff and the Ad Hoc Senior/Recreation Committee have met five times and accomplished the following:

- Created and issued an RFP for an Owner's Representative for the City for the Senior/Community Center Project. RFP posted on the Michigan Intergovernmental Trade Network.
- Created and issued an RFQ for architects to qualify for Final Design and Construction Plan Preparation. RFQ posted on the Michigan Intergovernmental Trade Network.
- Conducted a community open house with NORR, LLC at the YMCA Building on April 26, 2024 to receive community input.
- Reviewed the current project progress with NORR, LLC. After discussion, NORR, LLC assigned a new lead architect for the project, Mr. Brian Colburn.
- Conducted an optional pre-bid meeting at the YMCA building (including a building walk-thru) for the RFQ for Architectural/Engineering Services for Final Design and Construction Preparation. Thirteen firms were present.
- Completed an extensive federal grant request through Congresswoman Haley Steven's Office with accompanying letters of support from City Commissioners, County Board Representative, State Legislators and other local government officials (Next partners). The federal grant requested eight million dollars (\$8,000,000.00) be dedicated to the Senior/Recreation Center project.
- Reviewed the Community Survey with NORR, LLC and completed the needs assessment report for the City Commission.
- Received five bids to be the City's Owner's Representative from the RFP. City staff and all
  members of the Ad Hoc Senior/Recreation Committee were provided with the proposals and asked
  to score each proposal using a scoring sheet authored by City staff.
- Provided the City Commission with a recommendation for an Owner's Representative for consideration.

## **Department of Public Services**

## **Booth Park Entry Plaza & Trail Improvements**

The Parks and Recreation Board held a Booth Park Entry Plaza & Trail Improvements Public Input Session at their May 7, 2024 meeting. A preliminary park plan and some concepts and ideas were presented for feedback. The preliminary plan is being routed through City departments and to various boards. Feedback is also being received via a survey on Engage Birmingham at engage.bhamgov.org/booth.

### **Tennis Courts**

Maintenance on the West Lincoln Well Tennis Courts included crack repair and new acrylic surfacing earlier this month. The work was performed by a contractor for the amount of \$25,500. Crack repair can extend the life of the courts by up to 10 years.

Poppleton Park will receive pickleball lines over the tennis courts to make the courts multi-use in an effort to provide additional locations for pickleball. This will be scheduled within the next couple of weeks.

### **American Public Works Association Scholarship**

The Department of Public Services applied for and received a scholarship to attend the American Public Works Michigan Chapter's Great Lakes Expo in May of this year. Attendees will learn the latest trends and best practices in infrastructure management, technology and sustainability from both seasoned professionals and emerging leaders.

## **Rouge River Clean-Up Day**

The City of Birmingham has hosted Rouge River Clean-Up Day events for over twenty years with the help of volunteers from our community, churches, schools, scout troops and neighborhood associations. On Saturday, May 18, 2024 volunteers gathered at Lindon Park and worked paths along the Rouge River to clean up trash and remove invasive species such as Garlic Mustard. Thank you to all who participated in this event.

## **Engineering Department**

### **Illicit Discharge to Rouge River**

The City has determined the source of the sanitary sewer discharge and discussions are occurring with the property owner. We have been keeping the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE) aware of the City's progress in finding the source.

## **Lead Service Replacement Program**

The City will be starting a door-knocking effort to replace water lead services at no cost to property owners. If the property owner is not available, a flier will be left. Flier recipients should follow the steps to schedule your water service replacement.

## **Water Service Verification Program**

The City has a deadline of October 2024 to submit material information from 364 water service lines to the Michigan Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy (EGLE). The City randomly selected 364 water services to verify the material for this EGLE requirement. The City will be knocking on doors to talk to property owners about verifying the "In-Home/Business" water service line material. If a property owner is not home, a flier will be left with the next steps. Property owners can schedule an inspection by an authorized City representative at (248) 303-2292 or determine the in-home/business material themselves with the steps provided in the property owner letter.

### **Redding Road Project**

The Redding Road Paving Project began last month. The contractor installed the water main on Redding Road, including horizontal directional drilling under the Rouge River. Redding Road is closed westbound between Lake Park Drive and Woodward Avenue. Local traffic only is being maintained eastbound on Redding Road.





### **Edgewood Road Project**

The Edgewood Road project began in April and the contractor is continuing with sewer installation. Edgewood Road is closed northbound between Southlawn and Lincoln. Local traffic only is being maintained southbound on Edgewood Road.

## **Arlington, Shirley, and Brandon Project**

The Engineering Department will host a property owners meeting on Tuesday, June 4, 2024 from 5:30 p.m. – 7 p.m. to discuss the upcoming project.

## MDOT - Woodward Ave. and Brown/Forest Intersections

Construction started on this project in March. This work requires daily single lane closures along northbound and southbound Woodward. At times, Brown and Forest may be closed for up to 10 days for construction.

### **Fire Department**

## **Trench Rescue Training**

Last month the OAKWAY technical rescue team performed a trench rescue deployment. The deployment scenario consisted of an 8-foot-deep, 16-foot-long trench with failures with a trapped "occupant". The team members used low-pressure airbags, Paratech struts, and trench panels to shore up the unstable walls to extricate a 200-pound training mannequin safely. The soil weight is multiplied as the trench gets deeper and reaches weights of several tons. The team uses tabulated data to ensure all benchmarks are achieved for the safety of the rescuers and victims inside the trench. All Fire Department members are trained in trench rescue collapse in case of a local emergency at the scene of a trench such as a sewer repair, new basement, sink hole, etc. The Birmingham Fire Department has 7 members on the OAKWAY Technical Rescue Team and has a consistent leadership presence with its senior leadership from Battalion Chiefs Tom Hughes and Chris Deman.

## **Multi-Modal Transportation Board (MMTB)**

The Multi-Modal Transportation Board has been conducting study sessions on the purpose of the MMTB and reviewing Robert's Rules of Order. Staff and consultants have been doing training sessions due to a number of new board members. Board members have also been discussing ways to manage contentious meetings and how to professionally manage large crowds.

The MMTB had their annual field trip on Thursday, May 16, 2024. The board visited Ferndale once again to check out the newly implemented road diet. Participants took SMART's Fast Bus down to 9 Mile where they walked and rode MoGo bikes around Ferndale's multi-modal infrastructure.

## **Wayfinding & Branding Committee**

A Request for Proposals for Wayfinding & Signage Phase 1 Fabrication and Installation is posted on the Michigan Inter-governmental Trade Network (MITN). Signage in Phase 1 includes ground mounted identification signs (gateway signs on Woodward) and pedestrian kiosks. The Wayfinding and Branding Committee will review bids and select a contractor for this work at their June 10, 2024 meeting.

## **Police Department**

### **Woodward Noise Bill**

After just over a year of communicating with our State elected officials and requesting a change in State law, the Police Department is pleased to share this <u>release from Representative Natalie Price</u>. Her proposal (House Bill 5696) addresses the issues with the existing State law and provides law enforcement a better opportunity to address these nuisance vehicles. The bill was introduced to crack down on vehicles intentionally modified to create excessive noise while being used. The bill ensures police officers have the authority to stop vehicles for excessive noise and increases penalties for related infractions. On Tuesday, May 21, Chief Scott Grewe will be in Lansing at the request of Rep. Natalie Price to testify in the hearing of the new proposed House Bill on vehicle noise.

## **Woodward Service Drive Parking Restrictions**

Over the last few weekends, the Police Department started enforcing the newly implemented 15-minute parking zones in the Woodward service drives. The efforts have shown improvement in reducing the crowds, racing and noise. Fewer cruisers are loitering for extended periods and fewer return after being made aware of the restrictions or ticketed. The Police Department will continue to enforce these restricted parking zones along with moving traffic violations as one of many initiatives to reduce dangerous driving and improve our citizens' quality of life.

## **Letter of Commendation for Dispatcher Joseph Misiak**

On May 7, 2024 at approximately 8 a.m., a distressed mother called 911. The mother who was highly upset indicated her 18-month old baby had stopped breathing. The mother advised she and her husband were currently driving to Beaumont hospital. Dispatcher Misiak was able to calm the mother and obtain their current location. The dispatcher remained calm under a tense situation and made the quick decision to provide them directions to Fire Station 1 to receive immediate medical attention while contacting the fire station to dispatch them to their parking lot. Once there, the baby was stabilized by the Fire Department and ultimately transported to Beaumont Hospital.

Dispatcher Misiak demonstrated an outstanding level of service that reflects the highest level of emergency response that may have saved this baby's life.

### **Scam Alert**

Birmingham dispatchers have recently received several phone calls from citizens who had been contacted by alleged Birmingham police officers who claim the citizen is a suspect in a crime. The citizens state they received phone calls or emails that appear to be coming from our agency, and are advised to turn themselves in immediately or pay a bond via gift card.

Our department will never contact anyone to request a bond payment via gift card or request credit card information through email or phone call. Please do NOT directly pay anyone claiming to be from our agency. If you are unsure of the allegations made against you, please call us directly to confirm at (248) 644-3405.

## **Parking Systems Update**

### Repairs

In April, staff submitted a Request for Proposals for 2024 Chester St. Parking Structure Repairs. The primary project objectives are to address structural, waterproofing, and facade repairs at the parking structure; repair or improve the mechanical, electrical, and plumbing systems; install LED lights, and paint portions of the garage for improved aesthetics. The project will go before the City Commission in early June and begin shortly thereafter. It will take twelve to fifteen months to complete.

The City planned and budgeted for comprehensive long-term repairs at all five City garages. The North Old Woodward Garage was the first garage to be addressed in 2022-2023. The Chester St. Garage is the second garage to be addressed and is starting in June of 2024. Following the Chester St. Garage will be Peabody, Pierce, and finally the Park St. Garage. Repairs to all five garages are anticipated to continue through 2026.

## **Operations**

As part of the transition from SP+, the help buttons in the kiosks have been going to a 3<sup>rd</sup> party call center of Parker Technology. This call center is different from the one SP+ used until January 2024. Beginning May 1, 2024, all calls for help have been directed to the local parking office in the Chester St. Garage during business hours (8 a.m. – 5 p.m. Monday through Friday). During off-hours and weekends, calls continue to go to Parker Technology. Answering calls locally will help improve the guest experience and expedite responses. Staff members are very happy with the new call center and hopes guests are too.
