AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MAPLEWOOD, MISSOURI, AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A COST SHARE AGREEMENT WITH GREAT RIVERS GREENWAY FOR CONSTRUCTION OF THE DEER CREEK GREENWAY TRAIL FROM SUSSEX AVENUE TO CANTERBURY AVENUE

WHEREAS, Great Rivers Greenway (GRG) and the City have agreed to combine the Deer Creek Greenway trail project with the City’s Greenwood Boulevard street reconstruction project; and

WHEREAS, the City will receive federal funding through its Surface Transportation Program grant, GRG’s Congestion Mitigation & Air Quality grant, and contributed funds from GRG in the amount of \$536,711; and

WHEREAS, the City will manage project oversight and payment administration; and

WHEREAS, construction is anticipated to begin in late summer 2025.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MAPLEWOOD, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section I. The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute a Cost Share Agreement with Great Rivers Greenway for construction of the Deer Creek Greenway trail within Maplewood city limits from Sussex Avenue to Canterbury Avenue.

Section II. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect fifteen (15) days after its passage and approval.

Memorandum

Date: February 20, 2025
Re: National Opioid Settlement Participation

Maplewood now has an opportunity to participate in the National Opioid Settlement Agreements following a recent legal decision that expanded eligibility to municipalities under 10,000 residents. Previously, only Missouri cities with populations over 10,000 could participate.

The Missouri Department of Mental Health oversees the state’s settlement program, which provides funding for opioid abatement programs including counseling services, naloxone distribution, treatment court support, family support services, and connection to treatment resources

On February 18, Richmond Heights City Council approved their participation in the settlement agreements. Given our shared social services coordinator with Richmond Heights, their participation creates an opportunity for coordinated public safety and social services response should settlement funds be awarded.

The attached resolution would authorize participation in the settlement agreements and allow the City Manager to execute necessary documentation. If funds are awarded, their use would be restricted to approved abatement activities as defined in the settlement agreements. The application portal reopens October 1, 2025.

Staff recommends Council approval of the resolution to preserve our ability to access these funds and potentially expand local abatement services.

Dear Members of the Missouri General Assembly,

In accordance with the Memorandum of Understanding between the State of Missouri and national opioid settlement administrators, please find the First Annual Report on Opioid Settlement Funds. Missouri's Memorandum of Understanding between the State of Missouri and its political subdivisions on proceeds relating to the settlement of opioid litigation, Section F, Number 42, requires each recipient of settlement funds to provide the General Assembly with a report detailing the following for the preceding year:

1. The amount of settlement funds received;
2. Details on how settlement funds were spent; and
3. Whether each expenditure fits within an approved use.

The Memorandum of Understanding also requires this report to be published on the state's website. The website established for this purpose, and for the public reporting of opioid settlement funds as required by individual settlements, can be found at: <https://moopioidsettlements.dmh.mo.gov>. This report, as well as additional information, including expenditures by local governments, can be found on the website.

Section 196.1050, RSMo, established the Opioid Addiction Treatment and Recovery Fund, into which all monetary proceeds are deposited for the State of Missouri's share of settlement distributions. This report covers settlement proceeds and expenditures made since the fund was established in April 2021.

The Department of Mental Health is the lead agency for reporting opioid settlement expenditures. The department has worked with the Missouri Attorney General's Office, the Missouri Association of Counties, and the Missouri Municipal League to communicate settlement reporting requirements. A report will be distributed annually going forward, each March, for the preceding calendar year.

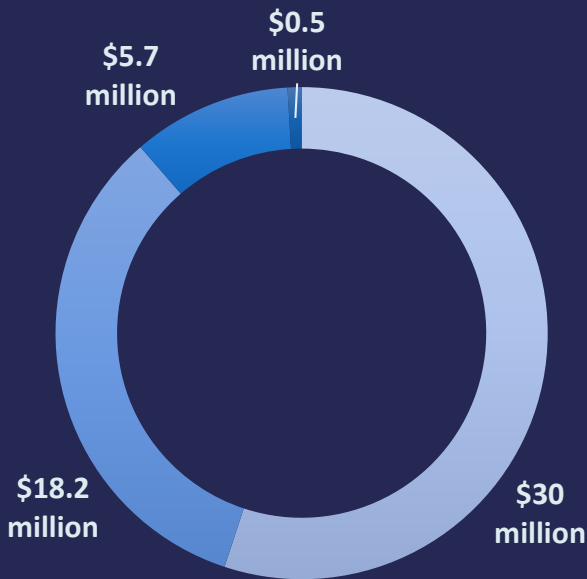
Overview of Settlement Funds

(\$54.4 Million in Payments)



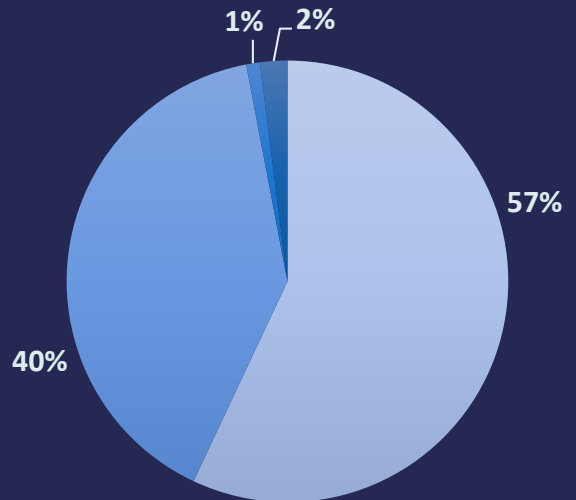

WHEREAS, the opioid epidemic has severely impacted communities across Missouri, including the City of Maplewood; and

WHEREAS, the State of Missouri is participating in national settlement agreements with opioid manufacturers, distributors, and other defendants to address the opioid crisis; and

WHEREAS, local governments within Missouri are eligible to receive settlement funds to support opioid abatement efforts; and

WHEREAS, participation in the settlement agreements requires the City to release its claims against the settling defendants as a condition of receiving settlement funds; and

WHEREAS, settlement funds must be used solely for the purposes provided in the settlement agreements, including treatment, prevention, and other opioid abatement strategies; and

WHEREAS, timely participation in the settlement agreements is necessary to maximize available funding for addressing opioid-related issues in our community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF MAPLEWOOD, MISSOURI, AS FOLLOWS:

Section I. The City Manager is hereby authorized to take necessary administrative steps to submit a claim on behalf of the City to participate in the National Opioid Settlement Agreements.

Section II. The City Manager is authorized to execute settlement documents and agreements necessary to join the National Opioid Settlements on behalf of the City.

Section III. Any funds received from the National Opioid Settlement Agreements shall be deposited into a designated fund and their use restricted to approved opioid abatement purposes as specified in the settlement agreements.

Proposed Updates to Chapter 38 – Personnel of the Code of Ordinances

Staff initiated a review of Chapter 38 of the Code of Ordinances during collective bargaining agreement (CBA) negotiations with the Fire Department. While some proposed changes are necessary to align the code with the CBA, this review revealed broader needs for modernization and compliance with federal guidelines. We are approaching these updates in phases to ensure thorough review and successful implementation.

The initial phase focuses on *Article IX - Hours of Work, Leaves of Absence, and Other Benefits*, along with related sections impacting the CBA. These sections are highly interdependent and form the foundation for other needed updates.

Staff has conducted a comprehensive review of Chapter 38 and proposes several key updates to align with current law, best practices, and operational needs. The major changes and their rationale are:

- Leave and Benefits Modernization
 - Converting all leave accruals from monthly to biweekly system to conform to our new HCM system
 - Updating parental leave provisions to be more comprehensive and recommending limited paid parental leave
 - Updating bereavement leave to provide clearer categories and time allowances
 - Establishing clear parameters for a new Sick Leave Bank program
- Pay and Classification Updates
 - Clarifying overtime eligibility and calculation methods
 - Increasing compensatory time limits
 - Documenting holiday pay provisions for uniformed shift workers
 - Revising injury leave to align with workers' compensation law
 - Updating travel reimbursement to align with GSA standards
 - Establishing secondary employment guidelines
- Legal Compliance
 - Adding an FMLA policy section
 - Updating chapter definitions to reflect current law
- Administrative Improvements
 - Streamlining probationary period provisions
 - Modernizing jury duty leave administration
 - Updating position definitions and classifications

- Risk Management
 - Strengthening workplace safety provisions
 - Updating injury reporting requirements
 - Clarifying return-to-work procedures
 - Adding provisions for light duty assignments

These changes will expand existing employee benefits, ensure legal compliance, improve administrative efficiency, enhance clarity for employees, and standardize practices across departments.

This phased approach will allow for careful consideration of each section of Chapter 38 and, eventually, Chapter 2 – Administration, while ensuring continued operations under existing policies until updates are approved. Prior to the proposed ordinance changes coming to Council for approval, they will be finalized by Department Heads, reviewed by legal counsel, and given a 45-day inspection period by all staff. We anticipate proposed legislation coming to Council in May, which will allow time for approval and implementation alongside the launch of our new HCM system.
